PIGEON PASS ROAD

CORRIDOR PROJECT

(Ref: Pigeon Pass Road Project Overview)

The Counties of Riverside and San Bernardino, together with the Cities of Moreno Valley and Grand Terrace, are proposing a project to extend and realign Pigeon Pass Road from Hidden Springs Drive in Moreno Valley to Mount Vernon Avenue in Grand Terrace. The project would be a four lane, divided, limited-access arterial. Approximately 5 miles of improvements are planned. The intent of the Pigeon Pass Road improvement project is to increase safety and improve circulation within the area, as well as reduce traffic congestion on roadways between the counties. The agencies recognize the importance of retaining the rural character of the area (context-sensitive design), while at the same time increasing safety and improving access and circulation. The project team includes agency representatives from areas surrounding the project including the Counties of Riverside and San Bernardino and the Cities of Colton, Grand Terrace, Loma Linda, Moreno Valley, Redlands, Riverside and San Bernardino.

One of the specific improvement alternatives identified in the CETAP studies was the widening, paving and realignment of existing Pigeon Pass Road

and its connection with either Center Street or Main Street in the City of Grand Terrace. Extension of Pigeon Pass Road was considered necessary to help meet the needs of inter-county circulating. The CETAP studies also identified enhancements to Reche Canyon Road, east of Pigeon Pass Road, as another necessary inter-county corridor improvement. The widening of Interstate 215 (I-215) is an additional priority for improving inter-county travel. The Counties of Riverside and San Bernardino, together with the Cities of Moreno Valley and Grand Terrace, are jointly carrying the Pigeon Pass Road improvement project forward into preliminary engineering and environmental analysis. The Riverside County Transportation Department is serving as the Lead Agency.

A Memorandum of Understanding has been executed by the participating agencies pledging to simultaneously advance the planning and design of both the Pigeon Pass Road and Reche Canyon Road projects to address traffic growth, local access and inter-county travel needs. Public involvement and input will continue to be a critical component of the planning study process.

Main St. or Center St. connection?

Center St. is already the major street through Highgrove and is not capable of handling more east/west traffic. When the Bixby warehouses are built, Center St. will be the only route the trucks can use to and from the freeway. Any trucks using Spring St. would only be permitted to travel eastward on Spring St. because of a currently a restriction on Prospect Ave. where there is no westward outlet for trucks over 6 tons. Trucks going eastward on Spring St. would be going in the opposite direction of the I-215 freeway. Michigan Ave. also has a 7 ton limit restriction that is currently in place.

More traffic through Highgrove on Center St. between Moreno Valley and the I-215 freeway will be detrimental to all residents in Highgrove especially since the Elementary School, Fire Station and other historically significant buildings are all on Center Street. Center St. already has traffic problems when school gets out and parents pick up their children and it is even worse when freight trains often block the Center Street grade crossing.

Using Main St. for the Pigeon Pass Corridor connection will help relieve traffic through Highgrove that is created by surrounding cities such as Grand Terrace and Moreno Valley and others who just want to take a short cut from Pigeon Pass to the I-215 freeway. It is not fair to put even more traffic right through the heart of Highgrove via Center St. that is created by other cities in both counties.

The Pigeon Pass Corridor should connect to Main St. not Center Street!

Aerobatic pilot practices for Highgrove Day

You've seen it and you've heard it- now here is a close-up report of the stunt plane we have been seeing east of Highgrove. We received an e-mail from a Highgrove resident Chris Neiman asking us to follow up on what many residents have seen and heard. Thanks Chris for contacting us.

This custom made Staudacher S600 is one of the best performing aerobatic aircraft in the world with 330 hp, a wing stressed to 23g, and a 400 degree per second roll rate. The unique wing-design allows exploration of the extreme edge of the flight envelope. Its unmatched strength allows for hard-driving flight including flat and knife edge spins, lomcovàks, multiple tumbles and snaps, and Martin's own maneuvers, the "boomerang" and the "Barber Pole", leaving the audience wondering "how can a plane do that!". There are 35 Staudachers in the world, all hand made by Jon Staudacher in Kawkawlin, Michigan.

Martin Kennedy is a Professor of Geochemistry at the University of California, Riverside where he studies planetary atmospheric development with NASA support. Originally from Australia, he has lived in the United States for 20 years. Martin brings a distinctive athletic style to aerobatics that requires extensive physical conditioning to counteract the strong forces placed on him during his aerobatic routines that reach 10 g's. During the competition season, he follows a rigorous training schedule that includes daily flight practice, weight lifting, and 10 miles of running. Martin divides his residence between Riv-

erside and Bishop, CA in the high Si-

Martin Kennedy really enjoys practicing for competition east of Highgrove between the foothills. This location is one of the few places left that allows aerobatics because there are no homes in the area. We had lunch with him at Flabob, he flew to Apple Valley that afternoon, and returned about 5:00 pm for more practice where we could see him doing his aerobatics from our back yard.





Many of you know that 27 of the 40 acres owned by the Bixby Land Co., between the school and United Methodist Church, recently was approved for warehouses.

But are you aware that there are 2 more developments being discussed at our community meetings?

One of these projects is the possibility of building 88 apartment units by the new library on Center St. near Michigan Avenue. This project has been discussed for the last 2 meetings and was presented to the MAC by Tony Mize of Work Force Home Builders.

At the March meeting, Kirk Wallace another builder representing AW

The Highgrove Municipal Advisory Properties West, presented their proposal for consideration that would add an additional 150 apartments just south of the 88 units.

> The 150 units would be located between Spring St. and Center, (south of the school), east of Garfield St. and west of the Gage canal.

> So basicly speaking the entire area of vacant land between Center St. and Spring St. and Garfield St. and the Gage canal- would all be apartments under these 2 proposals under considerartion.



Reasons for a preferred connection to Main St. instead of Center St., from Moreno Valley:

the I-215/La Cadena/Iowa Ave. In**terchange** that was planned in 2006 that is a small interchange from Main St. to the I-215 freeway and La Cadena St. (Photo 7640) Drive. (See above graphic from City of Colton).

In addition, the cost of a future RR old Methodist Church underpass on Main St. could be shared by Riverside County and San Bernardino County since Main St. is on the County Line. A future RR underpass on Main St. would be adjacent to the new High School that is going to be built in Grand Terrace on the San Bernar-High School graphic top right).

Traffic created by the regular use of the new High School and/or High School sporting events would have freeway access, via Main St. as well as other vehicles coming through Highgrove to get to the I-215 from Moreno Valley. Main St. is already a 64 foot wide street between Mt. Vernon and ter St. (#7649) Sanrive Street.

A RR underpass at Main St. would have much less impact on Highgrove than an underpass at Center St. because Main St. does not have any historical buildings east of the I-215 freeway!

Reasons not to connect to Center Street from Moreno Valley:

- Existing Highgrove Public Lidino County side of Main Street. (See brary-690 Center St. (# 7645)-at Garfield St.
 - Future Highgrove Public Library on Center St. (near Michigan Ave.- no photo available)
 - In addition to the above, the following locations are only accessible from Center Street:
 - Existing Fire Station-469 Cen-
 - Existing Community Center-459 Center St. (#7648)
 - Existing Child Care Facility-459 Center St. (#7651)
 - Future Bixby warehouse complex will have to use Center St. for all See P. 5, 8, & 9 truck access.

Grand Terrace High School?



It's comming! What do you call it?

The above conceptual diagram is going to be the 3rd High School in the Colton Joint Unified School Dis-

This school is going to be on the north side of Main St. in Grand Terrace. It will be built on land formerly occupied by the Inland Timber Co. and the property will soon be ready for grading.

A new High School has been sought after for years by Grand Terrace. And since it is on the north side of the street and Highgrove is on the south side of the street we realize that the traffic created by this new school, whose students will be of driving age, will greatly impact Highgrove.

Careful planning should include taking this future traffic created by the school and future traffic from Moreno Valley through this area without going through the middle of Highgrove.

Eventually an underpass will be built under the BNSF RR tracks on either Main St. or Center Street. It is my intention to send copies of this issue to those agencies who are involved in determining the best route for a future Pigeon Pass Corridor so that they will understand how important this decision is to the future of Highgrove.

I have a letter dated Aug. 5, 1986 from the Parks Dept. showing the addresses of historically significant homes and structures in Highgrove.

On March 12, 2009, I attended a meeting of the Colton School Board. The parking lot was full and the building was full too because the Grand Terrace people heard that the school board wanted to name the new High School in Grand Terrace after a former Colton School Board member Ray Abril Jr..

Many people filled out cards to speak but only a few were allowed to speak during the "Public Comments". After a few minutes the Chairman, Mel Albiso asked if anyone "other than supporters for the Grand Terrace name wanted to speak". Many of us in favor of the Grand Terrace name did not get to speak!

I have lived in Colton and I have lived in Grand Terrace and my kids played Colton/Terrace Little League and later 3 out of my 4 children graduated from Colton High School.

Several Highgrove people waited for 5 1/2 hours once to get to speak to the Riverside County Board. of Supervisors on an important issue, but we were allowed to speak! Chairman Albiso cut the public off and a letter was read from Herb Fisher, SB County Superintendent of Schools supporting the name Ray Abril Jr.



Grading continues for giant warehouse between Columbia Avenue and Palmyrita Avenue



These giant earth movers are leveling out the property between Palmyrita Ave. and Columbia Ave. for a giant 520,000 sq. ft. warehouse. This warehouse will be right next to the Perris Valley Line RR track that is between the new warehouse under construction and the existing warehouse (near top of photo) on the south west corner of Palmyrita Ave. and the PVL RR track.

This devise is called a "spade" and is attached under each aileron that catches air and allows the plane to have very quick responses during the difficult aerobatic moves. As the aileron goes up, the top surface of the spade catches air and assists the plane in making very quick turns. Martin calls these spades his "power steering"!

The magnificent man and his flying machine!



Martin is a professor of Geochemistry at UCR but he loves aerobatic competition. He will fly in competition on May 1, 2009 in Apple Valley and he has agreed to practice doing his aerobatics during our Highgrove Day on May 9, 2009. His practice area is restricted to the airspace east of Highgrove but the plane will be visible from Highgrove Park for an exciting display of aerobatics you won't forget!



This devise located on the end of the left wing is a "sighting devise". It allows the pilot to line up the plane with the horizon for level flight, or when he lines up the vertical rod with the horizon that will tell him he is going exactly straight up. This is important during the competition. The 3rd part of the triangle is used to determine a 45 degree angle of the airplane in relationship to the horizon.

There is a possibility that his announcer will describe the maneuvers over our Public Address System at the park as he does his tricks. We are working on this but no definite details are available yet! Watch for the May issue!







The vacant portion on the top right side of the above plan indicates: Future "Commercial/Business Park" but this plan will build the large buildings first, instead of providing the community with services that are so desperately needed. At our Nov. 2008 meeting, the Bixby Land Co. explained the details of this project. Bixby also own 27 acres of land directly south of Spring St. that is all vacant land. This plan indicates that there will be 586 parking spaces and the director of construction for Bixby Land Co., Michael Hodges, stated "There will be trucks"! Center St. will be the only truck route since trucks have no westward access from Spring St. due to a 6 ton limit on Prospect Ave. and Michigan Ave. has a 7 ton limit between Center St. and Spring Street.

REDUCE Reuse Recycle BY CYNTHIA WILLIAMS F DC

"May there only be peaceful and cheerful Earth Days to come for our beautiful Spaceship Earth as it continues to spin and circle in frigid space with its warm and fragile cargo of animate life." United Nations Secretary-

General U Thant: March 21, 1971.

John McConnell first introduced the idea of a global holiday called Earth Day at a UNESCO Conference on the Environment in 1969, the same year that he designed the Earth flag. The first Earth Day proclamation was issued by San Francisco Mayor Joseph Alioto on March 21, 1970. Since then, there have been annual recognitions across the country. This year there will be a festival in Riverside at White Park. Hosted by Habitat for Humanity, Riverside and the ReStore (the store that helps to support Habitat for Humanity), it will be from 11am to 4 pm.

I've mentioned many times that "Earth Day is every day". In our disposable-minded society, frequently items that could be repaired or reused are thrown away. With a bit of thought and good intentions, you can get more life out of your items and save some money in the process!

Highgrove has some very hard water. The minerals will block every faucet, spray, and hole. For this problem, plain white vinegar will be your best friend. Run the vinegar through the coffee maker, through the dishwasher, and soak crusted dishes and shower heads in vinegar. When your towels get stiff and scratchy, it is from the buildup of minerals on the towels. Add four cups of vinegar to hot water and soak the towels for 8 to 10 hours. Spin them off and then put

them through a regular wash.

To extend the life of your dishwasher, besides cleaning the holes in the arms of minerals, soak and remove labels from jars. The labels that come off in the dishwasher can clog the works of the dishwasher.

Find new purposes with discarded items from your kitchen. *Oven racks* can be used as cooling racks or racks to hold things in the garage. Wooden cutting boards can find new life as a sign board, a stepping stone, a portable all purpose hard surface such as a lap desk, or attach small hooks and use it to hold your keys for the shed, etc. Obsolete coffee filters are absorbent and can be used instead of paper towels to clean up small spills and drain fried bacon. Line a flower pot with a filter to keep soil from spilling out the hole in the bottom of the pot. Use the filter instead of cheesecloth for a bouquet garni for soups. Polish and buff your shoes with your coffee filters.

Hang on to your old shower curtains also. A typical use is as a paint drop cloth. Some other uses are an off-season covering for your patio furniture or barbeque. Keep one in the trunk so serve as a tarp for roadside emergencies. I've used one many years for a ground cloth under my tent when I go camping. Having a yard sale? Having a family reunion or a party in the park? Paint a banner with your announcement and hang it out.

Make it a game to find new uses for your old, broken, or out of date home items. The current economy makes it a wise thing to do. The future of our community and our planet makes it the right thing to do Enjoy your Earth Day!

Groceries from the Backyard: A Harvest of Savings

(ARA) - The economy is tanking, grocery bills are climbing and food safety scares are on the rise. For the 43 million Americans planning a vegetable garden this spring, growing your own is a matter of dollars and sense. Food gardening will jump 19 percent this year over last year, according to a new survey by the National Gardening Association (NGA). Homeowners with shrinking household budgets are looking for help in their own backyards. Can planting a veggie patch really save you money? Government agencies and gardening organizations say yes.

Every \$100 spent on vegetable gardening yields \$1,000 to \$1,700 worth of produce, the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates. That's a serious hedge against skyrocketing food prices, expected to jump another 5 percent this year.

You'll get a half-pound of edibles from every square foot of ground devoted to backyard crops, NGA experts say. Even a modest garden (15 by 15 feet) can produce more than 100 pounds of garden-fresh tomatoes, salad greens, vegetables and herbs. Better flavor and bragging rights come with the harvest.

Planting a vegetable plot and keeping it productive isn't that hard if you start small, keep the basics in mind and plant reliable varieties. Take it step by

Lead with Location — A sunny, well-drained spot close to a water spigot is ideal. Leafy greens tolerate some shade, but other crops want eight hours of sun daily.

Suitable Soil — Adding organic material is the key to an easy-care garden. It loosens stiff soil, helps retain moisture and nourishes important soil organisms. Good "ingredients" include manure, humus and chopped-up leaves. Spread a 4-inch layer of



amendments on your plot and till into the top 9 to 12 inches.

Fertilize Faithfully — All edible plants remove some nutrients from the soil, and can quickly exhaust the soil without the help of a fertilizer. Always follow the rates given on the label when deciding how much to use. Water Wisely — One inch of water weekly is adequate for most vegetables. Soaker hoses or drip systems deliver water efficiently and keep foliage dry, fending off leaf diseases.

Patrol for Pests — Monitor insect damage but try to keep your crops pesticide-free. Hand-pick pests or dislodge them with a jet of water, then let natural predators do the rest. If you must spray, do it late in the day when beneficial insects are less active.

Pick the Right Plants — Flower gardeners gravitate to the newest, showiest varieties, but smart food gardeners appreciate the tried-and-true. Bonnie Plants, available coast to coast, are time-tested varieties selected to suit regional conditions. For best results you'll need to choose veggie and herb varieties suitable to your geographical location. 

REPRESENTATIONAL GOVERNMENT, OH REALLY?

When did you realize that your city, county, state or federal governments were almost totally out of your control? Oh, sure some of you vote, sort of. President Obama won by an overwhelming majority, the best turn-out for many years. But usually in the past twenty years voter turn-out has been very poor even in presidential elections.

But stop and think about how many decisions were made without your input, knowledge, or publicity. Frustrating, isn't it? Here in Grand Terrace we have a planning commission and a city council and these two entities pretty much run Grand Terrace and do exactly what they want to do without regard to what the citizens want. I cannot criticize when so few vote or show up at either of the above meetings. People believe that the members of these groups have out best interests at heart. They do not! You are allowed to voice your opinion but there are no answers, and the council particularly does as they damn well please.

Another group of elected officials is the Colton Unified School District's board of directors. There are about six members and maybe another twelve who are ancillary personnel. A meeting was held last month at which the subject of naming the yet to be built high school (No. 3 in the district) and the public was supposed to have been invited to give their opinions on naming the school, if indeed this complex is ever built. It has been a political issue in Grand Terrace for 25 years or more. I oppose the building of a new high school for Grand Terrace because it is so costly, at this point more than 100 million dollars and will not be finished until 2012 or 2013. We do not need a high school and we certainly do not need the debt. Steve Berry and Walt Stanckiewitz say that we already have the money. That is like saying that we should run down to the bank and take out a substantial amount and spend just because we have it.

Most of the Colton school board members want to name the yet un-built school after one of the Colton High School alumni, Ray Abril. In a poll taken recently by the school board a large majority of people voted to name the school Grand Terrace High School.

Someone on the school board said that there was no majority in the poll. But they did not poll the entire city of Grand Terrace eligible voters. Paul Owens of Grand Terrace said that the board should rename Colton High School the Ray Abril High School and the non-existent Grand Terrace School, Grand Terrace High School. Ima Davis said in the event that Ray Abril's name must be used then call the school Ray Abril/Grand Terrace High School. The Colton school board chose to manipulate the action by only asking some less than 200 people to

In addition to asking the public who wanted to speak, (speeches are restricted to three minutes the same as they are when one goes before the Grand Terrace City Council), it appeared that several of us wanted to say something. But after 15 minutes of speakers who voiced their opinions under public comments, suddenly the public comments were cancelled and several of us including myself were outraged! I wanted my voice to be heard and that is not difficult due to the volume of it. I was ignored, just like the others who had carefully planned their speeches. When people were shut off and not allowed to speak during the 3 minute public comments period, an uproar took place! Several others also wanted to speak and had filled out speaking cards.

Is this what the Colton Unified School District's Board of Directors considers proper behavior on their part? The school board had already made up their minds to name the school after Ray Abril. It was blatantly obvious that they had planned all along to ramrod their wishes. Why they even made a silly little effort to make us think we could be heard leaves me in the dark.

But folks this school will not be ready for occupancy for several years and at the next election for school board members we can replace them all! FINIS

transplant shock. Just tear off the bottom, set the pot in the ground and water.

If you're ready to try your hand at creating your own backyard grocery garden, here are 10 easy crops to plant:




