





MOTORCYCLIST SPEED RESULTS IN DEATH

On March 18, 2014, at approximately 4:52 p.m., a male motorcyclist (40, San Bernardino) was riding a 2003 Yamaha northbound on Interstate 15 (I-15), south of State Route 60 (SR-60), within the #1 lane at an undetermined



speed. An independent witness reported the male motorcyclist traveling at a Ms. Walia (female, 37, Rancho high rate of speed prior to the collision. Cucamonga) was driving a 2012 Honda minivan within the #1 lane north of the motorcyclist's location. For reasons still under investigation, the rider of the Yamaha collided into the rear of the Honda. The motorcyclist was ejected from the Yamaha onto the roadway. Following the collision, the motorcyclist was transported to Kaiser Permanente Hospital in Ontario where he succumbed to his injuries. All northbound traffic lanes on I-15 were closed for approximately 45 minutes; traffic was diverted to SR-60, due to the collision and subsequent investigation. It is undetermined at this time if alcohol and/or drug use were a factor in this collision. The motorcyclist was wearing a helmet at the time of the collision. The driver of the Honda was wearing her seatbelt at the time of the collision. This collision is currently under investigation.





Golf Tournament for Liver Disease Research!

On April 5th, 2014 Ms Ola Harris from Aerie #997 of the Fraternal Order of Eagles will be sponsoring a golf tournament to support liver disease research at UCSD, and in particular the research efforts of Dr Michel Mendler. As a very active member of this Aerie, Ola has been supporting Dr. Mendler's efforts for 4 years, contributing to research on Hepatits C (HCV) and complications of cirrhosis. Dr Mendler is a Gastroenterologist and Hepatologist, Professor of Medicine, having worked at USC, Loma Linda University Medical Center and currently at the UCSD Health System. He specializes in the management of liver disease and the medical aspects liver transplantation.

On this occasion Dr. Mendler would like to take the opportunity to educate the readers of Highgrove Happenings on Ola's story, and several key points on HCV, including new highly effective, well tolerated treatments.

Ola Harris started her journey almost 13 years ago with complications of cirrhosis due to HCV. She most likely had acquired the infection during a blood transfusion she had many decades before. I met her in 2005 when I assumed her liver care, and she rapidly declined, and underwent a liver transplantation in 2006. Ola made a resounding comeback and immediately focused her energy at the Fraternal Order of Eagles Arie #997 to foster education and advances in science that could benefit other patients with liver disease. But then a few years later her transplanted organ declined and in 2011 she was re-transplanted with a new liver and kidney. She has been doing great since, and throughout this harrowing struggle had continued, and continues to this day

to organize fund raising to support my research, and to educate all who want to listen on the importance of HCV testing and treatment.

Liver diseases that lead to cirrhosis are currently the 12th cause of death in the USA. Cirrhosis leads to up to \$2 billion in medical costs per year. Cirrhosis is a hardening of the liver due to long term injury of the liver, leading to loss of healthy liver cells that are replaced by scar tissue. This condition leads to worsening liver function and other complications due to poor blood circulation through the liver. Patients with cirrhosis also have a 20-fold risk of liver cancer as compared to people without liver disease. Cirrhosis leads to many life-threatening complications such as fluid in the belly (ascites) that can become infected (spontaneous bacterial peritonitis), bleeding from the food pipe (esophagus) due to bleeding veins (esophageal varices), confusion and coma (hepatic encephalopathy), severe malnutrition, infection, kidney failure, respiratory failure, and liver cancer.

The most frequent causes of cirrhosis in the USA today are obesity and HCV. Alcoholism and Hepatitis B are also important causes of cirrhosis. It is not rare that patients have "multiple hits", meaning that have liver disease due to the compounded effects of a viral hepatitis, obesity and/or alcohol abuse.

Currently 30% of the American adult population is obese, and approximately 80% have a condition called "fatty Liver disease". This is when fatty oils are deposited with the liver cells, causing inflammation at times. Diabetes is also a major risk factor. Perhaps 5% to 10% of these patients develop cirrhosis after many years.





What is Easter?

Today, Easter is decorated eggs, colorful baskets, bunnies, a new bonnet? It's a day when many people go to church, maybe for the only Sunday of the year. Yes, I suppose. But where did all that come from, and what does it all mean?

All-Time January Record **Shattered.** With eight of the last 12 months smashing ridership records, Riverside Transit Agency buses continue to reach unprecedented levels of boardings. A new report shows RTA buses handled 804,000 boardings in January, an all-time high for any January and a



nine percent jump from the same month a year ago.

Federal Review Yields **Positive Results**

RTA got a thumbs-up from a major federal audit that inspected 18 areas of operation. Board members recently reviewed and accepted the fi ndings of the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Triennial Review, which found the Agency in compliance with all areas of inspection, including legal; procurement; financial; maintenance; and safety and security. The audit is required every three years for agencies such as RTA that apply for and receive federal grants. This positive report reflects the fact that RTA continues to perform at a high level and is making good use of taxpayer dollars. During the threemonth review, which concluded in December of 2013, FTA offi cials met with RTA staff to discuss administrative and statutory requirements, review documents and inspect the Agency's facilities. No deficiencies were found in any of the areas of review, a rarity among these types of audits.

Blind singer who sees with his fingers and sings with his heart will perform at Highgrove Eagles!

Consisting of four musicians, lead vocalist Arturo Espinoza and various lead guitarists/vocalists, baseplayer John Hill and drummer Gary Morris, are all fine singers in their own right. The Pheonix Rising band has played at The Festival Of Lights function in Riverside, big house parties, senior citizen centers, a few night clubs throughout the San Bernardino county such as the Greentree in Victorville and Concerts in the parks. the list of venues also includes Hesperia Days, market nights, Tom's Farms in Corona, various



casinos from the Inland Empire to San Diego county and Willy Boy's, in Morango.

Throughout its history as a working band, Pheonix Rising has been fortunate to have had the services of various professional lead guitarists and musicians who have opened for country greats such as Willie Nelson and Clay Walker. Lead singer Arturo Espinoza opening for country singer Jody Messina at a U.S.O country show and opened for the group "War" at the San Bernardino County fair in the nineties. And this band's current Bluesy singer/bass player, John Hill has worked with oldies groups like the Coasters, the Drifters, and Jay and the Americans, while drummer extraordinaire Gary Morris has also played and worked with singers like the incredible Etta James, Southern rock performers such as the Charlie Daniels Band and the Allman Brothers.

For about thirty years, Pheonix Rising has seen its share of changes where its members are concerned. Initially begun in the High Desert by Arturo Espinoza and his younger brother, J.R Espinoza, the aim of this band was then (and still continues to be) to put on a good show and perform a variety of country and classic rock covers by groups like Credence, Brooks and Dunn, Merle Haggard, The Eagles and the Beetles among many other greats. Still another drawing point that gives Pheonix Rising its uniqueness, is its blend of strong vocals and rich harmonies as well as its group member's ability to interact with the audience on a personal grass-roots level; says Arturo Espinoza, the band's founder: "It's not enough to just be able to sing. You've got to have a group of dedicated and well-seasoned musicians backing you up all the way because without the right chemistry and without their support, doing what I do would not be possible."

Blind since birth Arturo Espinosa is the lead singer with the Phoenix Rising Band that will be at the Eagles on Friday April 18, 2014. The music starts at 7:00 pm and is open to the public free of charge. Those wanting to have dinner should come at 6:00 pm. Arturo has a machine he uses to type in the lyrics and they are converted into brail.

The Eagles is located at 466 E. La Cadena Dr. on the east side of the freeway 1 block south of Center Street. Come and listen to live music every Friday evening and Karaoke every Sunday evening.

The treatment is preventative, in that early diagnosis and a change in lifestyle with healthy dieting and exercise can make the fat in the liver go away, halting the progress of the disease.

HCV is still the number one cause for liver transplantation in the USA. There are approximately 3 million people with HCV in the USA, and many do not know they are infected. The risk factors include intravenous drug use or having been transfused with blood before 1991; and HCV is currently diagnosed mainly in people born between 1945 and 1965. But in approximately 30% of patients, the exact route of infection cannot be found. Sexual transmission is very rare, in particular between monogamous couples. The risk of mother to child transmission during birth is approximately 3%. The disease is really caused by the immune system that very slowly attacks the liver cells that contain the

virus. All symptoms are absent for many years, sometimes decades. Not all patients will develop cirrhosis, but at least 20% will do so, and if not detected and treated, they can go on to need a liver transplantation. Since the discovery of HCV in 1990, continual progress has been made in developing medications to clear the virus. Injections of interferon (a protein secreted by white blood cells) have been the mainstay of treatment, and changes in its formulation along with ribavirin by mouth led to improved success rates, but for most it was only 40%. In addition, these drugs are very poorly tolerated, in particular in patients with cirrhosis, and following liver transplant. But in the past years we now have a genetic test (called "IL28b-snp") that can predict which patients will respond or not to Interferon. And the most exciting news is the development of new classes of drugs called "direct acting anti-virals" or DDAV's that target specific parts of the





Top left photo: The Union Pacific's Riverside Line from Colton to Riverside now ends on the south side of La Crosse Ave. in Grand Terrace. The seldom used track ends because a new wider bridge was needed due to the widening of the I-215 freeway and it was not financially beneficial for the UP railroad to build a new wider bridge.

Top right photo: The old pillars that supported the previous railroad bridge are still positioned in the middle of the freeway but if you look closely the track on the other side is now abandoned because no trains can enter from this location or from the Marlborough Ave. location where the other end of the track ends near the Perris Valley Line track.

The track on the other side of the freeway wall is not usable that goes from Grand Terrace through Highgrove to Riverside but remember this single track is not the same track as the 3 BNSF main lines that go through Highgrove.

Bottom left photo: The Union Pacific track is still usable from Colton southward across the Santa Ana river to La Crosse Ave. and can be used by the UP Railroad for storage of railroad cars if needed. Several years ago the UP spent one million dollars to rebuild the bridge over the Santa Ana river when 2 Union Pacific engines were left stranded when the bridge became impassable.



virus, disabling its multiplication and defense. Since December 2013 we have now many options to treat all patients for their HCV, and new drugs will be available perhaps by the end of 2014. We are moving into the age of high rates of HCV treatment success with short duration of treatment and very tolerable side effects, without using interferon in many cases. Success rates are now between 60% and 90%. This

will allow specialists to treat many more patients that previously possible, even including those with cirrhosis and those with HCV that has re-infected the transplanted liver. I encourage those that have risk factors or a finding of abnormal liver tests to ask their doctor about HCV testing, and if found positive, to seek care from a specialist.


