Phil's Philosophy

HENRY'S STORY

In the early 1960's when in my early teens, my grandparents Henry and Maude Turner tearfully related the following story to me. This is essentially an oral history that has been supplemented by reading pertinent materials both, from the Internet and bound volumes. I have taken the liberty of putting my perceptions and conjectures to work to describe what I believe his feelings and perspectives would have been. Please forgive any inaccuracies.

Henry Arlington Turner was born around Custer City, Texas on September 26, 1895. Custer City is a very small farming community in Cooke County in the north central part of Texas, close to the border of Oklahoma, with it county seat in Gainesville about 20 miles away. Custer City was not much of a town then and barely exists now, just a grocery store/mail center and two or three other buildings pertaining to farming. The farmland in this area of Texas is very poor for growing much. Decades later oil would be found, making some families wealthy. But, in the early part of the century poor would correctly describe most of the inhabitants of this area. Henry, an only child was born here on his parent's farm.

Henry's father was a real cowboy who settled down after a life on the range and started farming. A story goes that while traveling home from a cattle drive Henry's dad, Robert, ran into another cowboy who asked to buy his horse in an exchange. Henry's dad told the stranger that his horse was not for sale. At this time the stranger said that it would be better if he went ahead and sold him the horse and introduced himself. At that point he exchanged the horse and received \$50 from the stranger. That stranger was Sam Bass, a notorious gunman of the era.

know was a very kind and patient In 1915 Henry was 20 years old and man. I cannot recall Him ever raising his voice, or saying an unkind

word about anyone. He was a small man of about 5'6", always appropriately, but casually and neatly dressed. He was soft-spoken with a very good sense of humor. Henry was a great fisherman, preferring to fish for crappie, black bass and catfish in Lake Texoma. He was a wonderful carpenter with a full shop in his home. Henry made many pieces considered family heirlooms. He loved westerns on television primarily to see the horses. He attended the Broadway Church of Christ three times a week.

The main social activity of the area was the church. His parents belonged to The Church of Christ, one of the "big three" churches of the area (Baptist, Methodist, Church of Christ). It was here that Henry was to meet his future wife, Maude Blurton. Maude would put Henry off for years before finally consenting to marry him. Maude was to become mother to two boys. James and John. She loved to talk to her friends on the telephone, and watch Jack LaLane and Art Linkletter on the television. She also loved to have her photograph taken often calling out, "Henry, get the Kodak", during family get-togethers.

In this very rural area of Texas, Henry would meet and develop friendships that would last his entire life. He played dominos with these friends once a week or so until his death. I would often listen to these old friends tell and retell stories and jokes that had a large sprinkling of barnyard humor. Because this area was so very rural and sparsely populated Henry's circle of friends and acquaintances was very small. I never saw Henry take a drink but smoked Winston cigarettes. When he came down with a cold he would switch to Kools, thinking that the menthol was soothing to his throat. I received a letter from home reporting his death, two weeks after The Henry Turner I was to the fact, while serving in Viet Nam rode a horse everywhere.








dom went into Gainesville, the closest town of any size. To hitch up a wagon, gather up the family and ride 12 miles into town was an all day ordeal. His family did not own an automobile; they owned a total of three horses. One of those horses was strictly a riding horse, his fathers. Henry's horse, Lucky, was a combination work and riding horse. Then, as now, one became very attached to their horses. They were like part of the family. Many times riding through lonely rural roads and woods, Lucky was his best and only companion. He talked to Lucky, and each knew the others moods and feelings. Henry didn't like to use Lucky for farm work, but was more often than not, necessary.

In August 1914 war broke out in Europe. To Americans, and especially to Americans living in the most rural areas, this war may as well have been on the moon. President Wilson promised that America would not be drawn into any European wars. The mood in America was one of isolationism, wanting nothing to do with war in Europe. All the combatants believed that victory would be theirs by Christmas. No one foresaw the extent of brutality and hardship that the world would be plunged for four and a half years.

In April 1915 during the second battle of Ypres, the German Army frustrated over the progress of the war introduced poison gas against the British Army. That action was to bring an additional everyday terror to a war that was already becoming the most agonizing in human history. A war that would eventually consume 30 million lives.

Sometime in 1915 or 1916, for young men.

the Army Quartermaster Corps came to Northern Texas to draft horses. The Army had several specific things that they were looking for in draft horses. They were looking for relatively young, very strong and hearty horses. They were looking for horses that were not pampered and used to foraging if possible. They required horses that had history of no medical problems. Additionally they were interest in horses that were not skittish, or jumpy or adverse to loud noises and confusion. They had simple field test for most of these traits.

When Henry saw the men from the Army arrive he had a bad feeling from the start. He knew that his family needed the money that the Army would pay, but still could not foresee the heartache this arrival would bring.

It quickly became apparent that the only horse that they were interested in was Henry's. Henry's heart was in his throat. He anticipated the worst. Very soon, the soldiers came to a decision, they wanted Lucky. There was little option. The Quartermaster Corps had the power to choose which animals they bought. That combined with the financial needs of his family left them with no option at all. He tearfully had to say goodbye to his beloved companion. His last sight of Lucky was of her trotting behind the Quartermasters wagon, down the dusty road leading away from his farm. I believe they were compensated \$12.50.

In April of 1917 the U.S. was finally drawn into the Great War. The U.S. would enter the war "to make the world safe for democracy". The Army would resort to a a draft system to fulfill their need



Citrus St. railroad crossing




The new railroad crossing of the Perris Valley Line railroad track at Citrus St. has a center divider to prevent vehicles from driving around the gates.

California Dreaming

Time has been on my mind a lot lately. I guess it's because I don't have as much of it left in my life as I used to. When I was 20 years old I didn't give it a single thought. Now that I'm seeing the other end of the tunnel of life, I am very aware of the passing of time.

It's said "Time heals all wounds." If you're the vindictive type, sometimes, "time wounds all heels." When we've suffered a loss such as a death or a breakup, others have opinions how much time should pass before it's "time to get over it and move on." Death of a loved one might be allowed a year to get over but after a breakup time is not needed to heal; "get back in the game right away. That's your best revenge." It is such a personal thing.

When our hearts have been broken, looking back, the pain can be as sharp today as it was five years ago. Why do some of us bounce right back but others have a broken heart and can't seem to move forward? Time stops for them.

When and why does time seem to drag on forever? Kids waiting for Christmas morning, waiting for the last bell for summer vacation to start, waiting for their birthday, time seems to drag by so slowly. When does time fly too fast? When we are having fun, when we are on that vacation, when we are on the best date of our lives time-- time goes too fast. We say "Wait! Already? We just got started!" Where did the time go?



Sean Carroll is a theoretical physicist at Caltech where he focuses on theories of cosmology, field theory to go to my job for another five or six hours. I would sit in my car in the school parking lot, look at

and gravitation by studying the evolution of the universe. Carroll's book, From Eternity to Here: The Quest for the Ultimate Theory of Time (2010), gives us his theory of time and the universe. "I'm interested in the arrow of time: the fact that the past is different from the future. We remember the past but we don't remember the future. There are irreversible processes. There are things that happen, like you turn an egg into an omelet, but you can't turn an omelet into an egg... the arrow of time, gives us the feeling of progress, the feeling of flowing or moving through

"That's a waste of time!" How often are we told that or do we think it? Wasting time is seen as foolish, as if it is a currency you have thrown away. "Time is Monev" puts a higher value on time and the waste of it is considered irresponsible. We Americans are known to have an admirable work ethic. Sleep is sometimes seen as a weakness, napping is an offense. Vacations are for the lazy. Science weighs in on the topic of sleep and naps frequently with solid studies proving the necessity. Habits of thought are tough to change, especially in the corporate world where "time is money".

"James Maas, former chairman of the Department of Psychology at Cornell University who is widely credited with coining the term 'power nap,' says people should choose between 20 and 90 minutes for a power nap." A nap of 45 to 60 minutes can result in an increase in memory function, according to researchers at Saarland University in Germany. I learned the value of power naps many years ago when I was in chiropractic college. I was lucky to get six hours of sleep a night and was constantly tired. When I finished a seven hour school day I had about 15 minutes before I had to go to my job for another five or

my watch and tell myself "you have 15 minutes" and close my eyes. My eyes would pop open right at 15 minutes. I would feel more refreshed and ready to push through the rest of the day. I still utilize the power nap.

Daylight Savings Time (DST) has kicked in with the usual noise about the necessity, the questionable benefits, the unproven financial benefits and the general nuisance of it all. This year ten states introduced bills to either eliminate DST or to stay on DST year-round. Currently DST runs from mid-March to mid-November, which seems to suit most people. DST was first envisioned by Benjamin Franklin; of course in his day, people planned their day around available

sunlight. Lighting by oil or candle could be expensive (Franklin had "discovered" electricity by then but not how to use it.) The introduction of DST came during WWI as a cost saving measure, but was short lived. For the past 100 years Congress and others have debated it, made changes to the dates, and scheduled it last year-round. Arizona and Hawaii have found the perfect solution: ignore DST and ignore their clocks. The stay on Standard Time year-round.

A saying attributed to a North America Native American sums up the discussion: "Only the white man's government would be so stupid as to cut a foot off the top of a blanket, sew it onto the bottom, and think they have a longer blanket."
