



### Do Residents Have a Say in What Happens to Their Community?

After the 1,409 Spring Mountain Ranch Homes and the 105 D R Horton homes and the 72 Lennar homes have all been built, Highgrove will still have over 250 acres of vacant buildable land.

But what will be built on these 250 acres that is owned by outside developers? Will existing residents only find out when construction begins or will we be able to express our preferences about what we want and need in our community?

The answer is for our community members to be pro-active by monitoring what is being done at the Riverside County Planning Dept. and Planning Commission where the developer shows the



#### county what they want to build on their property in Highgrove. Here are some samples of LAND USE in Highgrove. LAND USE:

#### Warehouses in the middle of Highgrove?

Years ago, the owner of the 40 acres of vacant land between Center St., Spring St., Garfield and the old UP railroad track came to one of our former Highgrove MAC meetings and gave us an outline of what Bixby Land Co. wanted to do with their property in the middle of Highgrove. (See Bixby Warehouse plan on right)

Then on Jan. 13, 2009 the Board of Supervisors approved this project. (See Feb.2009 pages 1, 4 & 5)

(No access for trucks over 6 tons)

The above plan shows several large buildings that are planned on the 40 acres of vacant land by the school. The vacant portion on the top right side of the above plan indicates: Future "Commercial/Business Park" but this plan will build the large buildings first, instead of providing the community with services that are so desperately needed. At our Nov. 2008 meeting, the Bixby Land Co. explained the details of this project. Bixby also own 27 acres of land directly south of Spring St. that is all vacant land. This plan indicates that there will be 586 parking spaces and the director of construction for Bixby Land Co., Michael Hodges, stated "There will be trucks"! Center St. will be the only truck route since trucks have no westward access from Spring St. due to a 6 ton limit on Prospect Ave. and Michigan Ave. has a 7 ton limit between Center St. and Spring Street. This project will add more truck traffic to Center Street!

But today if the land is still vacant, and the builder wanted this project to be put on "Fast Track", why wern't these warehouses ever built? (See Oct.2011 pages 1 & 4).

#### They won the battle but we won the war!

Fortunately for Highgrove residents, the builder and his consultant, Pat Meyer of Urban Environs in Redlands waited over 2 years and their building permits expired on Jan. 13, 2011.

Then Bixby made a zone change from warehouses to residential and the property continued to remain vacant. (Go to page 1 of the Nov. 2013 issue of Highgrove Happenings).

Then the Bixby property (40 acres plus the adjoining 27/28 acres on the south side of Spring St.) was sold to Lansing Development Co. from San Diego. Gregg Lansing came to one of our MAC meetings and said he wanted to build single family homes, apartments, condos and town houses on the property.

<u>But Highgrove needs services</u> and the MAC requested that the property along the south side of Center St. would be a shopping center with a grocery store, and possibly a Bank, Post Office, and misc. shops to accommodate our residents because we have to take our money to Grand Terrace in San Bernardino County for retail services. If a shopping center was built in Highgrove the tax money would remain in Riverside County.

#### LAND USE:

**Springbrook Estates** (See Springbrook plan on front page) Another project that has been on the books for a long time that is still vacant land is the Springbrook Estates project that is 183.5 acres that has been proposed as 650 individual lots for residential purposes. This property is between Spring St. and the arroyo and includes a portion between Spring St. and Center St. east of Mt. Vernon Avenue. (Additional Photo on P. 9). I understand that KB Homes is now the present owner of Springbrook Estates. KB Homes was also the builder for Spring Mountain Ranch.

#### LAND USE:

#### **Highgrove Metrolink Station**

For many years I have tried and failed to convince the Riverside County Transportation Commission to build a station stop and parking lot at Highgrove using the existing Metrolink trains that go between San Bernardino and Oceanside.

RCTC is still mad at me for exposing them for stating there was going to be a new Metrolink station built at Palmyrita Ave. when the property was already under construction for a 25 acre warehouse. (See our web site and Feb. 2009 pages 6 & 7.)

All the existing Metrolink trains would have to do at Highgrove is stop long enough for commuters to get on and off the train. RCTC owns 17.22 acres of vacant land at Highgrove that is right next to the track that the Metrolink trains use 7 days a week in both directions and if Spring St. was extended westward at Transit Ave. it would be ideal location for a parking lot for commuters. But in spite of support from both counties, surrounding cities, residents and Senators from both counties, RCTC built a Metrolink station at Marlborough Ave. on the Perris Valley Line that opened on June 6, 2016 but has not met any of the ridership they expected. This is another example of insufficient and improper

#### Cannabis store in Highgrove

At the Riverside County Board of Supervisors meeting on Nov. 17, 2020 item 21 was passed that will allow another retail Cannabis store to be built in Highgrove.

Item 21: County LAND USE Public Hearing:

This item "changed the zoning and amended Ordinance 348 related to commercial cannabis activities and establishes 1,000 feet separation requirement between cannabis retailers **unless** they are located with one-half mile of certain freeways. In those circumstances, the 1,000 foot separation requirement would not apply to the cannabis retailers".

#### The agreement also states:

"The associated development agreement has a term of 10 years, will grant the applicant vesting rights to develop the project in accordance with the terms of DA 2000002 and CUP 200010, and will provide community benefits to the Highgrove area."

Editor's note: The portions above that are underlined are the way the text actually reads but maybe the "with" one half mile mean "within" one half mile.

What does a half mile have to do with this subject? This was just a way to get around changing the distance between cannabis stores in Highgrove to only 250 feet or 290 as previously recommended by the applicant. This looks like additional stores could be added if they are within one-half mile of "certain" freeways. Doesn't Highgrove's Iowa Avenue fall into this category?

And what benefits will be provided to our community? How about a Grocery Store, Shopping Center, or a Metrolink station? **GRAND JURY:** 

On Sept. 28, 2020 the Highgrove Happenings Newspaper requested that at the next MAC meeting on Oct. 28, 2020 the agenda includes a report from the 2017/2018 Grand Jury. Two years ago, this Grand Jury stated that Highgrove residents need to know: "exactly how CSA126 funds are distributed."

But this item was not included on the agenda at the Highgrove MAC meeting on October 28, 2020.

And there has been no response received from the Riverside County Board of Supervisors or the Riverside County Economic Development Agency about the Grand Jury's recommendations. Nothing has been given to the Highgrove Happenings Newspaper nor has this item ever appeared on any agenda since the new Highgrove MAC was formed on October 30, 2019. Answers are overdue because residents are entitled to know:

#### "exactly how CSA126 funds are distributed."

MUNICIPAL ADVISORY COUNCIL RESPONSIBILITIES: All of the preceding articles about LAND USE and GRAND JURY are items that need to be addressed by the current Highgrove MAC. If the Highgrove MAC or someone does not pay attention to what is happening between the Riverside County Planning Commission and the Developers and Builders, Highgrove will lose its voice in determining our own future! It is time to be pro-active and not wait until construction begins!

about the needs and wants of the entire Highgrove community. There is no other organization in Highgrove that takes input from the public that is designed to be relayed to our county supervisor. This should be done by the MAC but can also be done individually.

Four of the other MAC members have already sent their photos and bios that were published in the May 2020 issue on our web site.

But after requesting a photo and bio for over one year so you could meet your Highgrove MAC chairperson, Christina Tejeda still refuses to communicate with your local newspaper. Many of my e-mails have gone un-answered and I have been unable to communicate with her on the phone number she gave to me at the first MAC meeting on October 30, 2019. Finally, in our November 2020 issue, I published her phone number and e-mail address.

Anyone in Highgrove can monitor the activities of the Planning Department and should be able to alert the Highgrove MAC chairperson who can relay your concerns to other MAC members about important issues in our community.

I immediately received two negative responses regarding this information being published but both complaints were from Cristina Tejeda and her husband who were both selected to be on the Highgrove MAC back on October 30, 2019.

I see no need to publish any other phone numbers or e-mail addresses for other MAC members because the MAC chairperson should be the one to call.

As a public servant in this position, publishing information such as the phone number and e-mail address of the MAC chairperson, should not be considered an infringement on her "personal" life because her position is a public position and her contact information should not be withheld from the public!

I have been trying unsuccessfully for over one year because all of our Highgrove residents should be able to contact the chairperson of their community.

### **Corona Virus Stats for Highgrove Requested**

Three requests were sent to the CDC for information about Highgrove Corona virus infections.

The requests were sent on July 22<sup>nd</sup>, Sept. 11<sup>th</sup> & Oct. 15<sup>th</sup>, 2020 because I want to publish the stats about the Coronavirus infections and deaths in the Highgrove Happenings Newspaper. I explained that Highgrove is an un-incorporated community in Riverside county and has the following boundaries:

Northern boundary: Riverside/San Bernardino county line at Main St., Western boundary: I-215 freeway, Southern boundary: Riverside city limits, Eastern boundary: Foothills east of Spring Mountain Ranch. The zip code is 92507.

There is also another part of Highgrove on the west side of the I-215 freeway that is part of Highgrove in Riverside county. Both the east side of the freeway and portions of the west sides of the freeway are in Highgrove which is designated by Riverside County as CSA 126.

CSA 126 stands for County Service Area and the 126 is the number assigned to Highgrove.

The zip code for the part of Highgrove west of the I-215 freeway is 92501. I have seen information published in the Press Enterprise about stats from

cities and other un-incorporated communities but I have not seen any stats about Highgrove so I would like to inform our readers in our newspaper about what is going on in our community in regard to the Coronavirus. Finally, after requesting information about Highgrove, on Nov. 21, 2020 the Highgrove community was listed in the Press Enterprise of having 185 cases and 1 death.

At this time, I do not know who that person was that died but our condolences are extended to their family! Continued on page 10.

This has been the most complicated, emotional, stressful, head-splitting year I think any of us have ever had. It will be interesting to see how history judges many peoples' behavior.

Obviously "The Virus", as I call it, has been the top discussion, no matter to whom you are talking. I doubt there is a single person left who hasn't been affected by it in some way. You will have known someone who has tested positive and fell in the range of none or mild symptoms to sadly, passing away from it. As of this moment, there are 267, 548 DEATHS in the US. That's half the population of Wyoming! With an average of one COVID death every minute, that number is going to rocket exponentially as we go into the next couple of months with "Super Spreader" events. Thanksgiving, Black-Friday shopping, Christmas, and New Years Eve and the Super Bowl. We will see over 300 THOUSAND deaths before the year is out. We went through a lot together; he was my comfort while I was going through the heartbreak of a bad breakup, chemo after breast cancer and surgery and he was my comfort when I lost my brother to cancer. Sonny was my best buddy and companion. His "crossing the rainbow bridge" (December 30th 2019) has devastated me all this year. I didn't have Sonny to comfort me less than three weeks later when my

baby brother Brad Williams passed away suddenly at the young age of 56. (January 17th) Brad was the youngest of the eight Williams kids of Highgrove. High blood pressure is called the silent killer. His was not managed properly and it took him decades before his time. He was brilliant, funny, caring and his loss has left the rest of us crushed. He leaves behind three adult children and a lovely grand-daughter. He had just married on December 31, 2019. His sweet wife Jen, will be a part of our family forever.

Katherine Johnson (February 24th, 101 years old) You may not recognize her name. She was a brilliant mathematician who worked for NASA for 35 years and was portrayed in the movie "Hidden Figures." She was a trailblazer not just for women in a "man's profession" but also for a person of color back in the 60's when it was difficult and sometimes dangerous to be a Black person.

The "Notorious RBG" (September 18th, 87 years old) Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg was a hero to many women. No matter your politicsconservative or liberal, one had to admire the woman she was. Astonishingly intelligent, fierce and determined; she was an icon and a trailblazer not just for women but for all peoples. Her voice will be missed. And those fashion setting collars... "Women will have achieved true equality when men share with them the responsibility of bringing up the next generation." ~ RBG

Sir Sean Connery (October 31st, 90 years old) The devastatingly handsome Scotsman set the bar too high for the other 007 actors to reach. PEOPLE magazine named him the "Sexiest Man Alive" at the age of 59, thus redefining recognition of attractiveness for people over the age of 40. His acting career spanned decades with his first appearance in Disney's "Darby O'Gill and the Little People" in 1959 to appearing in 1976 in "Robin and Marian" with Audrey Hepburn to portraying Harrison Ford's cantankerous father in 1989 in the first Indiana Jones film. A Journalism graduate of USC, he was a staff writer for two Los Angeles newspapers and wrote editorials for KNXT - CBS, for which he was awarded a regional Emmy. His stories covered everything from the fall of the Berlin wall, the assassination of Robert Kennedy, and he became so acquainted with the notorious gangster Mickey Cohen that when his son was born, Mickey sent flowers to my Aunt Ann in the hospital. My uncle was directly responsible for the groundbreaking introduction of television broadcasts from the courtroom, arranging the logistics for hidden cameras in the courtroom for the trial of Robert Kennedy's assassin Sirhan Sirhan in Los Angeles.

Uncle Howie and I had a special connection- we have the same birthdate. We shared a love of writing and frequently "talked shop" with him leading the conversations. He was incredibly witty, intelligent, and knowledgeable about world affairs and many other topics. Discussions with him were always fascinating and informative. In his infamous annual Christmas letter, typed out single spaced, covered edge to edge front and back, he gave a run-down of the year with humorous details, clever observations, and memorable stories. He and the love of his life, Ann were married just shy of 70 years. Due to the (damned) virus we were not able to gather to honor this amazing man.Due to the (damned) virus we were not able to gather to honor this amazing man. I'm still reduced to tears daily, missing him, my heart breaking, and realizing that for the first time in my life, I won't be able to celebrate my birthday with him. The above intersection is at Spring St. and Michigan Ave. in Highgrove looking southward toward the city limits of Riverside toward Sugarloaf mountain. If Micnigan Ave. could be extended across this field about 1/2 mile and connected to the area between the buildings near Palmyrita Ave. in Riverside, this would make Michigan Ave. a new north/south road all the way from Barton Road in Grand Terrace, through Highgrove and connect to Columbia Ave. in Riverside. This vacant land is part of the 183 acre Springbrook Estates property shown on the front page.

# **Blue Mountain Fire**

After Ardie Barnett spent over six weeks recovering from her fall and the Corona virus, between the Riverside County Hospital, the Reche Canyon Skilled Nursing Facility, the Loma Linda University Hospital, and the Highland Palms Skilled Nursing Facility. She was finally able to return home on Tuesday November 24<sup>th</sup>-2 days before Thanksgiving.

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# **Main Street Madness**

#### Letter from Jim Hazelrigg:

Hi, Barney - Highgrove Happenings has helped me with issues in the past that were above my pay grade and there is an issue that has steadily worsened through the 50 years that I have resided at 136 E Main Street. I have contacted our county representative regarding my concerns with no response or acknowledgment. The posted speed limit from Mt. Vernon Ave east on E. Main street is 25 mph - typical residential speed limit. Since all the homes on both sides of E. Main to the end of the street at Blue Mountain have sprung up, there is more traffic than ever before. Vehicles go up and down the street at high rates of speed and there are children nearby and cars entering and backing out of driveways that are endangered by speeding cars.

I contacted Karen Spiegel our county Representative describing the problem and suggested speed bumps or other means to slow traffic but have gotten no response from her at all. She would only have to park at the side of the street or on a side street to witness the problem. It seems inevitable that without speed control of some kind this is an accident waiting to happen.

I understand there would need to be coordination between Riverside and San Bernardino Counties since E. Main street is the dividing line between the two.

I don't have any clout, but hoping that maybe attention to this via Highgrove Happenings or other means might result in our neighborhood being a safer place.

#### Here is a re-print of another collision on Main Street over 11 years ago! (See our website dated December 2009)

On Nov. 21, 2009 there was a collision involving a Riverside County Sheriff car driven by a deputy working the beat 15 car out of the Jurupa Valley Station and another car was occupied with 3 adults and five children. Luckily there were no injuries. The deputy driving the sheriff car was not our regular Highgrove Deputy, Dean Colbert.

I received a call from Marlene Ritz about the incident while I was in the process of painting the trim on the outside of our house. When I arrived there was a large portion of the front end of the sheriff car lying in the middle of the intersection of Main St. and Mt Vernon Avenue. I talked to the driver who said she was from Rialto. She and 2 adult men and 5 children were southbound on Mt. Vernon Ave. when the sheriff car, that was eastbound on Main St. allegidly made a left turn in front of their southbound Ford with 8 occupants.

There were other sheriff cars present when I arrived and a CHP officer was investigating the accident. Later, I was able to talk to the driver who said she just acquired her car a short time Two cars collided with 9 people aboard but there were no ago. Her car was not as damaged as the sheriff car.
