WILLIAM (BILL) J. LEUER Born July 1946, passed away December 28, 2017, Riverside, CA.

Back in March of 2011, I wrote an article with the same name that contained photos similar to the photos in this issue. As stated in the 2011 article I cannot tell you where this private collection is located but I can tell you is that I have permission to tell you it is in the Riverside area. This collection was the lifetime project of Bill Lauer who recently passed away but has left a legacy that is the most unusual collection of antiques and collectable that I

SPRING MOUNTAIN RANCH PARK ALMOST READY







ATTENTION SPRING MOUNTAIN RANCH RESIDENTS:

Welcome to Highgrove and we hope you enjoy living in Spring Mountain Ranch.

Before any new homes were built in Spring Mountain Ranch the entire area only consisted of large citrus groves and back in 1992 the property where you now live was part of a much larger parcel that contained citrus groves. Before your homes were built there was a written ballot sent out by Riverside County in 1992 that the Highgrove property owners who voted to authorizea \$10.00 per month parcel assessment to pay extra for Highgrove's own Deputy Sheriff that was assigned exclusively to Highgrove. Then in 1997 another ballot was mailed out by Riverside County and another vote to continue our Sheriff was passed by 75.8 %.

The annual \$120.00 parcel assessment included all parcels east of the

I-215 freeway in older Highgrove and any new parcels created when the orange groves were sub-divided. Each new parcel would be contributing into the CSA 126 fund that would allow Highgrove, Spring Mountain Ranch, and other new residents to continue to afford paying for our own Deputy Sheriff.

The annual parcel fee has always been \$120.00 for residential property, business property, and vacant land but the cost of Sheriff protection increased while the fee always stayed the same.

Lately we have been receiving mixed signals from Riverside County who states that Spring Mountain Ranch property owners are now paying into the CSA 126 fund.

I have requested and received a Spring Mountain Ranch tax bill for fiscal year 2017/2018 and the CSA (Article Cont. on Page 4)

on their tax bill.

And recently I contacted a few property owners in Spring Mountain Ranch and ask for a copy of their tax bills to see if Spring Mountain Ranch property owners are also paying for the Deputy we no longer have.

It is important to know that we all still have Sheriff coverage by the Riverside County Sheriff's Department which is authorized through our regular property tax assessment just like any other community in Riverside County and we have no complaint against any of the Deputies.

Our complaint is that the \$120.00 parcel assessment was for ONE ADDITIONAL Deputy Sheriff Exclusive to Highgrove east of the freeway and we were willing to pay for it. But the Highgrove Deputy's position was eliminated without written notice to those who are still paying for the deputy with their property tax bills.

A Grand Jury Investigation is underway and Highgrove's Attorney has requested information from Riverside County Administration, County Riverside Sheriff Department, and the Riverside County Economic Development Agency.

Please check your property tax bills because I would like to know if residents of Spring Mountain Ranch are paying an annual assessment of \$120.00 into the CSA 126 fund because if you are, you are also

126 fee for \$120.00 does not appear paying for the Deputy Sheriff you do not have that could be patrolling all of Highgrove including Spring Mountain Ranch.

> The Highgrove Happenings Newspaper discovered that the EXCLUSIVE Highgrove deputy was eliminated in 2010 but property owners are still paying for the deputy we no longer have.

> I would like to see a copy of your property tax bill to see if some of the Spring Mountain Ranch property owners are paying and if some are not. Either way I would like to hear from you via e-mail highgrovenews@roadrunner.com or by calling (951) 683 4994.

> Your tax information will remain confidential and only be relayed to the Highgrove Attorney if necessary. Your tax information will not be published or given to any other person or agency.

> Please look at your property tax bill and give me a call.

CERT is about readiness, people helping people, rescuer safety, and doing the greatest good for the greatest number. CERT is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations where citizens will be initially on their own and their actions can make a difference. Through training, citizens can manage utilities and put out small fires; treat the three killers by opening airways, controlling bleeding, and treating for shock; provide basic medical aid; search for and rescue victims safely; and organize themselves and spontaneous volunteers to be effective.

CERT training is a commitment of 20 hours of training. There is no cost for the training. Only those who successfully complete the practical exercise with hands-on instruction in fire suppression, search and rescue, cribbing and medical will receive a certificate of completion.

> But it is almost unbelievable how many fires have eliminated entire neighborhoods and just when they thought it may be over the rains came to send mud into the burned out ashes they used to call home. With all of the devastation last year with storm damage to Puerto Rico and the east coast, additional suffering came with snow and cold blowing wind.

> While watching other parts of California and other parts of America suffering due to mother nature, I almost felt guilty wearing short sleeved shirts on these beautiful warm days in sunny Highgrove.

"Protect yourself, while riding your bicycle"

Courtesy Greg Pettis, Cathedral City When riding your bicycle:

• Wear a Properly Fitted Bicycle Helmet. Protect your brain, save your life.

• Adjust Your Bicycle to Fit. Stand over your bicycle. There should be one to three inches between you and the top tube (bar) of your bicycle. The seat should be level front to back. The seat height should be adjusted to allow a slight bend at the knee when the leg is fully extended. The handlebar height should be at the same level with the seat.

• Check Your Equipment. Before riding, inflate tires properly and check that your brakes work.

• See and Be Seen. Whether daytime, dawn, dusk, foul weather, or at night, you need to be seen by others. Wearing white has not been shown to make you more visible. Rather, always wear neon, fluorescent, or other bright colors when riding day or night. Also wear something that reflects light, such as reflective tape or markings, or flashing lights. Remember, just because you can see a driver doesn't mean the driver can see you.

• Control Your Bicycle. Always ride with at least one hand on the handlebars. Carry books and other items in a bicycle carrier or backpack.

• Watch for and Avoid Road Hazards. Be on the lookout for hazards such as potholes, broken glass, gravel, puddles, leaves, and dogs. All these hazards can cause a crash. If you are riding with friends and you are in the lead, yell out and point to the hazard to alert the riders behind you. • Avoid Riding at Night. It is far more dangerous to ride at night, than during the day. At night, it is harder for motor vehicle drivers to see you. If you must ride at night, wear something that makes you more easily seen by others. Make sure you have reflectors on the front and rear of your bicycle (white lights on the front and red rear lights on the rear are recommended), in addition to reflectors on your tire spokes, so others can see you. Many bicycle-related crashes resulting in injury or death are associated with the bicyclist's behavior. These include

such things as; not wearing a bicycle helmet; riding into a street without stopping; turning left; or swerving into traffic that is coming from behind; running a stop sign; and riding the wrong way in traffic. To maximize your safety, always wear a helmet AND follow the rules of the road.

Rules of the Road – Bicycling on the Road

Bicycles are considered vehicles, and cyclists have the same rights and the same responsibilities to follow the rules of the road as motorists.

When riding, always:

Ride with the Traffic Flow. Ride on the right in the same direction as other vehicles. Go with the flow – not against it.
Obey All Traffic Laws. A bicycle is a vehicle and you're a driver. When you ride in the street, obey all traffic signs, signals, and lane markings.

• Yield to Traffic When Appropriate. Almost always, drivers on a smaller road must yield (wait) for traffic on a major or larger road. If there is no stop sign or traffic signal and you are coming from a smaller roadway (out of a driveway, from a sidewalk, a bike path, etc.), you must slow down and look to see if the way is clear before proceeding. This also means yielding to pedestrians who have already entered a crosswalk.

• Be Predictable. Ride in a straight line, not in and out of cars. Signal your moves to others.

The date I was looking for was not on my desk calendar but I knew it was in October so I reviewed my copies of the Highgrove Happenings and verified that an article I wrote stated that I took Supervisor Tavaglione and 2 members of his staff on the Highgrove tour on Oct. 19, 2015.

So you can see that I depend on other ways to remember because I write things down! Fortunately, other people write things down too as shown in the following article!

• Stay Alert at-all-times. Use your eyes AND ears. Watch out for potholes, cracks, wet leaves, storm grates, railroad tracks, or anything that could make you lose control of your bike. You need your ears to hear traffic and avoid dangerous situations; don't wear a headset when you ride.

• Look Before Turning. When turning left or right, always look behind you for a break in traffic, then signal before making the turn. Watch for left or right-turning traffic.

• Watch for Parked Cars. Ride far enough out from the curb to avoid the unexpected from parked cars (like doors opening, or cars pulling out).

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


Black leaders, black teachers, and most important, black fathers need to step up just like everyone else and take responsibility for their actions,





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
