

On Jan. 3, 2013 another burro was hit by a vehicle on Reche Canyon Road. At about 6:00 am the above Mini-Cooper, driven by Mejia Van Akin, was on Reche Canyon Road traveling at approximately 45 mph. She said there was heavy traffic going the opposite direction with cars passing into on-coming traffic. This road has one with the highest accident rates in the Inland Empire. The burro came from the left side and struck her vehicle on the driver's side and went up and over the top of the car resulting in dents to the top. In spite of some face lacerations from the windshield glass she was able to continue on to work at the sheriff's office but she does not know the fate of the burro. After the collision she said that many people passed by and did not stop to see if she was OK. Please slow down for your safety and for the safety of the burros.

Spring Mt.Ranch owners attend MAC meeting

owners of Spring Mountain Ranch at their Highgrove office. The property is now in the hands of i Star Financial which is the company that took over after the builder, RWR Homes, was unable to start construction due to financial problems and the decline of the Real Estate Market.

My meeting with Scott Oullette, Allen Barrett and Troy Juve was on the afternoon of Jan. 23, 2013 which is the same day as our MAC meeting. We previously agreed to meet before the MAC meeting so they would be up to speed about our community concerns. i Star wants to be more involved in the local community and we discussed how we both can benefit by working together for the benefit of their project while addressing our mutual needs and the impact their project will have on our community. Both Allen and Troy came to our community MAC meeting and explained their goals and answered questions.

One of the things we discussed was finding a location to feed and water the burros in an area away from the homes. Previously, on Jan. 15, 2013 the President of the Riverside High-

On Jan. 23, 2013 I met with the land Water Co., Don Hough and I did a tour of the area to see where water could be made available for the burros. The Riverside Highland Water Co. is the company that will supply water to the Spring Mountain Ranch Development.

> Both the water company and i Star are looking into a suitable location. At our November 2012 meeting we had a sign-up sheet that circulated during our MAC meeting and about 15 people signed up to help resolve the problem of the burros being too close to the houses.

> Many people support helping protect the burros while others are tired of the animals leaving a mess in the local streets and eating plants and shrubs in their yards.

> At the MAC meeting our guest speaker was Allen Barrett from i Star. He talked about their plans to get the project moving again and they are working toward a goal of having certain changes made by the 3rd or 4th quarter of this year. Troy stated that the old Pigeon Pass Road was impassable due to a wash out. The road dead-ends near the south east portion of the Spring Mountain

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – Distracted driving is a serious safety concern for all drivers throughout California, especially teen drivers. Eighty percent of vehicle crashes

involve some kind of driver distraction. Talking on the cell phone or texting is the main source of driver distraction. The California Highway Patrol (CHP) is urging teenage drivers to stop texting, put away cell phones, and focus on driving. In an effort save lives, CHP along with Impact Teen Drivers will be conducting a year-long teen distracted driving traffic safety campaign through September 2013.

"The California Office of Traffic Safety grant is an exciting opportunity for Impact Teen Drivers and the CHP to continue to be at the forefront of decreasing the number of collisions and deaths associated with distracted teen drivers," said Kelly Browning, Executive Director of Impact Teen Drivers. "It will take a strong combination of education and enforcement to have a fundamental and sustained behavior shift toward driving distraction free."

California drivers age 20 years or older were involved in nearly 22,000 collisions from October 1, 2009 - September 30, 2010, in which a distraction was documented as a factor in the cause of the crash. As new drivers, teens are at an even greater risk of being involved in collisions due to distracted driving because of the peer pressures to stay immediately connected to their friends via text and cell phone. Teenage distracted driving is one of the leading contributors to collisions and near collisions.

"The CHP is urging teen drivers to focus on driving. Eliminate the urge to text or call by putting away the distractions," said Commissioner Joe Farrow. "Through education, enforcement, and the continued partnership between the CHP and Impact Teen Drivers, we can change this dangerous behavior."

The 12-month, grant-funded Teen Distracted Drivers Education and Enforcement II campaign consists of an education component, as well as distracted driver enforcement operations to be conducted throughout the state.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

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
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New Planning Commissioners










"In Loving Memory"

ROBERT KAY BARNETT Bob was born January 3, 1936 in Fort Wayne, Indiana to Ray and Cora Barnett. He passed away at his home on Monday, January 21, 2013 from complications of diabetes. Robert moved to Highgrove, California with his family in 1947. He graduated from Poly High School. His first job was at Sages Grocery. He then enlisted in the U.S. Army where he was stationed in Germany. He then went on to work at Hunter Engineering, which later became Alumax Aluminum. He was a truck driver for thirty years, with no accidents, and earned numerous safety awards before he retired. Bob touched many lives through his years. He enjoyed fishing, hunting, bowling, playing blackjack and spending time with his friends and family. He is survived by his wife of nearly 53 years, Wanda Barnett; his children, Pam Barnett of Riverside, Julie Lynch of Wisconsin,



five grandchildren; Shanna Lynch, Shelby Lynch, Brandon Lynch, Allison Meister and Tiffany Barnett; one great grandson, Nolan Meister and two brothers, Ronald Barnett of Grand Terrance and Richard ("Barney") Barnett of Highgrove. There was a graveside service held on Monday, January 28, 2013, 11:00 am at Olivewood Memorial Cemetery, 3300 Central Ave., Riverside, CA 92506.

My brother Bob was really proud of his Olds 98 and I wanted to share this picture with you to show the proud smile on his face as he polished his car. I believe the photo was taken around 1959 at the family home where we grew up. His recent death came as a shock even though we knew he was not in good health. Since his passing I have tried to keep busy because if I stop and dwell on the fact that I will no longer be able to see him or talk to him on the phone I become too emotional.

My healing process includes writing about the good times our family had since we moved from Ft. Wayne, Indiana to Highgrove in 1947 due to my mother's health. The house shown above was bought by our parents after we stayed in the 47 foot trailer we towed from Indiana and parked in a trailer park just north of Pitruzzello's Restaurant and then later at the Aloha Trailer Park. My two brothers, Bob and Ronald and my parents lived in the trailer for 18 months to see if my mother would be

healthier due to the change in climate. When our 5 member family moved into the house we were really glad to get out of that small trailer and into a house that actually had a grassy yard to play in. I am sure mom and dad were glad to get us out of that trailer too.

Both parents are deceased but my mother outlived my dad by 16 years.

All three of us-Bob, Ronald, and I were always doing something to scare each other by hiding in the dark when the other one came home and as brothers, we were always playing pranks on each other.

Bob had a good sense of humor and had many friends from living in Highgrove and working at Sages and Hunter Engineering in Riverside.

The three of us were on a bowling team years ago called the "Splinter Splitters" when we bowled at the 60 lane bowling alley on Chicago Ave. in Riverside. Bob was left handed and he could always get a better score than I could. Our brother Ronald has been bowling with the same team members for 51 years and he and his wife Geri still bowl several days each week.

I still recall the time when Bob came home late one night from working at Sages. When he reached for the pull chain in the bathroom to turn on the light-I grabbed his hand. I thought it was funny but he was so startled that I thought he was going to hit me because he thought everyone else was in bed!



But on a following trip to Alaska Bob told Ronald he caught a 225 lb halibut too and he had a picture to prove it!

(And it was not 7 feet long either!)

A lot of times the first one home would hide behind the front porch pillar and wait for the next brother to get home.

Bob was an outdoors man and liked to hunt and fish. After he hit the lottery he chartered a boat and took his fellow Alumax employees on a deep sea fishing trip out of San Diego.

He loved going to Alaska and went almost every year. One year when Bob and his 3 hunting partners went to Alaska to go bear hunting, after the pontoon plane landed and let them out, a bad storm came up and the 4 of them were stranded for 3 days in a very remote area of Alaska. Bob said they were in survival mode and he was glad to get back to civilization to get warm. And unfortunately they didn't get a bear!

A few weeks later I bought a bear skin rug at a garage sale in Highgrove and had it laying out on the expanded dining room table when he came over. He looked at the bear skin and asked where I got that and I said: "Oh I shot it out back in the back yard".

Ronald told Bob that we stayed home where it was nice and warm and we got just as many bears as he did!

One year he took my brother Ronald. But Ronald, the non-fisherman, caught a 225 pound Halibut that was 7 feet long. And every time after that, Bob tried to catch a bigger one but never did. On my trip to Alaska with Bob I thought I had caught a 226 pound Halibut (bigger than Ronald's or Bob's) but it ended up being a 31



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This salmon was actually this big! pound octopus that was stuck on the bottom and didn't want to let go. We fished in the ocean for Halibut and every other day we fished the Kenai River for Salmon. Bob had several trophies from his hunting and fishing trips to Alaska. I will truly miss my brother....... May he rest in peace!

Two street names were given to east/ west major thoroughfares east of Mt. Vernon Ave. by RWR homes, the former builder, without community input or consulting the Highgrove MAC. As a result, these names appeared on some of the maps made by RWR homes and many residents and the MAC were opposed to these names. The east/west designation is at Mt. Vernon Avenue. Addresses west of Mt. Vernon are West Center St. for example and since Center St. is an off-ramp of the I-215 freeway it would be much easier to find future addresses if Center St. remains the same name as it crosses Mt. Vernon

Avenue. Future addresses would be "East" Center St. on the east side of Mt. Vernon. The addresses on Main St. that are on the east side of Mt. Vernon are already "East" Main Street. Since RWR homes is no longer in charge of the Spring Mountain Ranch project these changes need to be made before any construction begins.

I have received the paperwork from the county to change the name of Center St. (east of Mt. Vernon) to "East" Center St. instead of "Old Highgrove Trail" and the name of Spring St. (east of Mt. Vernon) to "East" Spring St. instead of "Blue Mountain Drive".



The Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council is trying to get the names changed so that Main St., Center St. and Spring St. will retain their names on both sides of Mt. Vernon Avenue. Of the two streets that were named by the former builder, (Center St. and Spring St.), Spring St. is the fartherest away from Blue Mountain. There are presently no addresses on Center St. east of Mt. Vernon and only one on Spring St. east of Mt. Vernon Avenue.



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Second Annual Health Fair Adds Doctors and Services

The League of Latin American Citizens of Riverside, Council 3190 (LULAC) and the Chicano/Latinos for Community Medicine of Riverside City College (CCM) are again bringing a health fair to Riverside. Their 2nd Health Fair is being held on Saturday, February 23, 2013 from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM at the Cesar Chavez Community Center, 2060 University Ave in Riverside. The group's first health fair was held in October of 2011. There is no admission charge to the health fair and all services/treatments are free.

The City of Riverside Parks and Recreation Department is providing the venue.

Yolanda Esquivel, a LULAC member and Chair of the Health Fair Committee is very excited about this 2nd Health Fair. "I am very pleased at the tremendous support we are receiving from local and state health providers. We recruited 7 dentists at our 1st health fair. This time we will have approximately 30 dentists". I am so happy about this very generous support."

The Flying Doctors will again be flying in dentists from the Bay Area and this time they will be supported by dentists from The Buddhist Tzu -Chi Medical Foundation, a national health organization, headquartered in San Dimas and The Borrego Community Health Foundation, serving San Diego and Riverside Counties. According to Esquivel, LULAC and CCM expect that this year the dentists will be able to serve many more people in need. Bijan Sasaninia, a student at RCC, director of CCM and co-chair of the health fair committee, says that "This will be a substantial increase from the 1st health fair, in

the number of residents we will be able to serve for their dental needs."

This year the Health Fair has also added primary care services, provided by local doctors and optical services provided by the Lions club (Friends in Sight Organization)."

Gilberto Esquivel, President of the Riverside LULAC Council, says that the Lions Club will be bringing optometrists. "These optometrists will be giving vision screenings and will provide the required eye glasses (recycled). The eye glasses will be delivered the same day." This is fantastic! Says Gilberto and adds that "This is a much-needed and valuable service for our residents and we are most grateful for all of these providers who have generously donated their professional services."

According to a 2010-2011 study prepared by the School of Public Health of Loma Linda University entitled "Policy Brief: Critical Juncture Confronting the Inland Empire" enrollment in Riverside County Medically Indigent services programs has

more than doubled since 2007. This study also documents that 28% of Riverside County residents are not insured and Medical caseloads have increased by 12%.

According to Bijan Sasaninia, the health fair co- chair, "the health fair is not a solution but only a temporary response to our most needy medically indigent residents. There is a tremendous need for these medical services and our residents are in a desperate and urgent need for the medical services being provided." Please Contact:

be quite rewarding to be the officer in charge who makes the call to just follow the fleeing vehicle until it runs out of gas and stops. At that point the correct decision was made.


