Iowa Ave. Overpass dedicated Jan. 8, 2014



City of Riverside Mayor, Rusty Bailey made the opening remarks at the official dedication of the Iowa Ave. overpass at 9:00 am on Jan. 8, 2014.

It was a day that we have all have been waiting for! The overpass over the BNSF main line at Iowa Ave. will enable traffic to continue in and out of Highgrove without having to wait on freight trains or passenger trains. Construction started when the street was closed on Oct. 1, 2012.

Many of the businesses in Highgrove were drastically affected due to the street closure during the construction process that took one year and 3 months to complete. The overpass is within the city limits of Riverside and is the main north/ south arterial between Riverside and Highgrove, where it connects to the I-215 in Colton.

With the assistance of Local, State and Federal funding the construction has now been completed. According to Riverside Mayor, Rusty Bailey, Iowa Ave. has 16,000 vehicles per day, including 25 school busses and 25 RTA busses. This project cost approximately \$31.3 million and required relocation of utilities, communication lines, gas lines and sewer lines. RCTC invested more than \$11million in Federal funds, the State of California \$16.5 mil-

lion from the State Proposition 1B Trade Corridor Improvement Funds, BNSF railroad contributed \$1.4 million, and the City of Riverside invested \$2.1 million dollars.

Mayor Bailey thanked the contractor Security Paving and their subcontractors and the Hill International team for construction management of this project.

Mike Gardner, Riverside City Councilman in his comments at the podium, stated that there are 90 freight trains and 10 passenger trains per day along this segment of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe rail line. The rail traffic prior to the grade separation had approximately 6 hours per day of traffic delay for the average driver. Beyond helping residents, visitors and businesses in this area, this grade separation eliminates approximately 3 minutes average delay for each emergency responder that encounters a train. This project will improve the quality of life for nearby businesses and residents.

After the ribbon cutting the dignitaries rode over the overpass in our 1957 Chevrolet (Cont. on P. 5)

The Historic Rail Lines of Highgrove

Over one hundred years ago, tiny steam locomotives and new electric trollies swam through the sea of orange groves that surrounded Highgrove. The triple tracks of today began as a single track that opened back in 1882. Highgrove then was the California Southern Railroad stop for steam engine powered trains carrying passengers to and from Colton,

Temecula, Fallbrook, and San Diego. Later stops on this line even included Perris, Elsinore, and San Bernardino. The Santa Fe Railway, now BNSF, eventually absorbed the line, including a track running west to

Riverside. The little wooden station sat near Center Street between the

two tracks.

The old Santa Fe Depot was on the south side of Center St. between the track to San Jacinto (behind the depot) and the main track to Riverside.

Further east up Center Street there is a single track that is now abandoned. This was used by the tiny steamers of the Southern California Motor Road from 1888. The engines were disguised as trollies to appeal to the rural public and to prevent frightening horses. One of them (number 20) is preserved at Travel Town in Griffith Park. Passengers could ride south to Riverside or north to San Bernardino using a link to another motor line there. The old rails now end near Marlborough Ave at a location formerly called Point of Rocks and the other end was recently cut off by the widening of the I-215 freeway.

Around 1913, Highgrove passengers could catch the new Pacific Electric red trolley cars and travel to distant towns like Corona, Redlands, Rialto, and even Los Angeles. The trolley stopped at Center Street on what is now the 215 freeway. Old tracks nearby at De Berry Street date back to 1903.

The Inland Division faces the widest spectrum of traffic enforcement challenges of the CHP's field Divisions. Officers patrol an area larger than 12 individual states. Included in the geographical boundaries are the lowest point in the United States at Death Valley, and the highest point in the contiguous 48 states at Mt. Whitney.

Officers working the western section of the Division encounter some of the most intensely congested roads in the nation at the intersections of Interstates 10, 15, 215 and Highways 210, 91, 71 and 60. In the Division's sparsely populated eastern region, motorists tend to speed. All freeways have been adopted for radar enforcement.

Inland's two fixed-wing airplanes and two helicopters are essential to the enforcement operation. The fixed-wing planes patrol hundreds of miles a day over the desert and along the Sierra's sheer eastern face. The helicopters are a vital tool for the desert and mountain areas where people are injured or stranded while driving their off-highway vehicles, or become lost while hiking.

The Special Enforcement Unit (SEU), with 8 officers and 4 specially trained dogs has received honors at the local, state and national levels for the number and size of its drug seizures and the number of persons arrested. In addition to the team honors, individual officers also have been recognized for their drug interdiction efforts on Inland's freeways. In 2006, SEU confiscated drugs worth \$139.7 million, up from \$81.7 million in 2005.

Printer closes doors

R P Publications in Colton surprised us when we picked up our Jan. 2014 issue. About 10 minutes after we picked up our papers and we were only about one mile away, we received a phone call saying that the papers we just picked up were the last issue to be printed at their building because they are going out of business, selling their equipment and closing their doors! (Why couldn't they have told us face to face?)

Our paper was not the only one to be blind sided! R P Publications also printed the Blue Mountain Outlook in Grand Terrace and the Grand Terrace High School newspaper, the Titan Echo. I notified them and they didn't know either about them closing. I do not know how many other small newspapers and school papers have been left without a printer.

Ron Pace bought the Colton Courier in 1979 but started R P Publications in Colton in 1991 with his son Ken. For 20 years R P Publications has been publishing the Highgrove Happenings and we have acquired a good following. But we were not given any notice or we could have printed something about it in our Jan. 2014 Highgrove Happenings.

So what did we do?

For 3 weeks we tried to see if there was another location to get our newspaper printed but small local printers are hard to find. We also considered going Green by printing an on-line issues only if we couldn't find another printer. We have been on-line since July 2008 and anyone can still go to our web-site and pull up any issue from any month since July of 2008. In fact that is the way we brought the local news to you. We would publish the paper on-line and the next morning R P Publications in Colton would take it off line, print the newspaper, and call us when

they were ready so we could pick them up.

We have already contacted several businesses that advertise with us and many businesses said they would continue advertising with us even if we were on-line only. We have people who read it on-line anyway due to the distance between Highgrove and where they live such as Albany, New York and Carson City, Nevada, for example and we have about 30 on our mailing list.

Here is the good news!

On Jan. 22, 2014, Ardie and I took Sally McGuire from the Blue Mountain Outlook, to Ontario and met with Reed Printing about printing both papers.

We know that many people like to read our paper in the printed form instead of on-line only but it has been a real challenge to find a printer who is willing to print what is considered in the printing world as a small amount. We want to thank Mike Reed for agreeing to print our small local newspaper.



And our papers will be printed on a whiter, higher quality paper with no increase in advertising rates to our regular customers.

convertible. We made about 3 trips over the new overpass and we thanked all of them for their contribution for making this project happen.

Some of those who attended and contributed that were not shown in the other photos were: Assistant City Managers, Belinda Graham and Deanna Lorson and Kathy Michalak, Chair of the Hunter Park Chamber of Commerce and Tom Boyd, Director of Riverside Public Works.

You may remember Tom Boyd from the Riverside City Public Works who attended the Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council public meetings at the Norton Younglove Community Center several years ago when he told us about the proposed overpass. At that time there was no

provision for a left hand or southbound turn toward Riverside (by the Lily cup) for traffic from Citrus St. on the east side of the overpass. As a result of input by the Highgrove MAC and with the cooperation of Tom Boyd and others, there will be two traffic signals installed on the overpass. There will be one on the south side and one on the north side for better traffic movement in both directions. The signals will be installed later but meanwhile stop signs will be used. He also said that Citrus St. between the overpass eastward to Northgate/Prospect will also be re-paved as part of the improvements to this area. Thank you again Tom and everyone else who has contributed to this project!

Please continue to drive carefully in this area because workmen may still be putting the icing on the cake!



There was a good turnout for the ribbon cutting ceremony and in addition to the chairs provided some of the people preferred to stand near the Lily Cup which is a historical monument that had to be protected during the construction. (I wonder how many ounces that cup actually holds!)

Drag Racing

WINDERNATIONALS

This month, right here in Southern California, Pomona to be exact, we welcome in the start of the new drag racing season. The season progresses across the country, and ends here in November with the National Finals.

In my opinion, drag racing is the most exciting, by a bunch, spectator sport. I've been to a Super Bowl, NASCAR, and a World Series. The only thing that closely compares is sitting at the end of the runway at DaNang and watching a flight of F4 Phantoms take off.

It is crazy, smoke flying across the track, earth shakingly loud.

The AA Fuel cars go from 0 to 325 miles per hour in 1000 feet. The tracks have recently been shortened for the fuel cars from ¼ mile (1320 feet), for safety. The cars were going just way too fast.

When I was in high school the ½ mile record was about 186 miles per hour. These cars now have engines that burn a blend of alcohol and nitro methane, and develop 10,000 horsepower. The record now for the same distance is 337 miles per hour.

Drag racing, and hot rodding as well started right here in Southern California. Guys returning from WWII, with training on fast airplanes and mechanics in general, began modifying their jalopies, to make them faster, and cooler looking. They took parts off to reduce weight, added displacement, bigger carburetors, some aerodynamics, and the American Hot Rod was born.

The NHRA, National Hot Rod Association was started by Wally Parks over 50 years ago, again right here in Southern California. This is the sanctioning body for drag racing. Their goal is safety for both the drivers and spectators.

The sport has many classes, from pretty much stock cars off the show-room, backyard garage modified, to nationally sponsored AA Fuel cars that light up the track.

Unlike any sport that I can think of, spectators are welcomed in the pit area and can easily interact with and get photos and autographs of their favorite drivers. It's a very family friendly, and welcoming event. As the late Heuell Howser would say, "It just don't get any better than this".



There are 2 intersections on the bridge that will be controlled by traffic lights. The traffic light on the north side of the bridge will govern traffic between the top of the bridge and vehicles that want to go westbound on Citrus St. toward the freeway.

Birthplace re-visited after 91 years!

Shortly after Christmas we received an e-mail asking if it would be OK if a former resident of our house could come by and see where she used to live. I recognized their last name so we set a date.

Then on Jan. 8, 2014 we received a phone call saying that they were leaving the Mission Inn and would be arriving in about 15 minutes. We were home so they came on over.

When I opened the front door I saw a long, black Limousine parked in front of our house and people were slowly starting to get out. I told Ardie to look out the front door and by then there were 10 people getting out of the limousine. We welcomed our visitors and I recognized 2 of them from the past. Many of you may remember Georgia Lee Petlanski who passed away in April of 2010 at the age of 85. I recognized Nancy Ross who is Georgia Lee's sister and I also recognized Tommy Ross, Nancy's brother but I had not seen them for many years.

After introductions we found out that it was Betsy Ross's 91st birthday and she was born in our front bedroom that we now use for an office for the Highgrove Happenings. The family limousine ride was arranged by Betsy's daughter Cindy Holbrook and the group came to Highgrove to bring back some good memories of their childhood days. They stood on the front porch for pictures and then we invited them inside.

We showed them the house and the book we made when we remodeled the house about 15 years ago. They told us what they remembered about their old house that was built in 1900.

My parents bought the house in

1947 from the Armbrusts, Tommy and Nancy's grandparents. We were glad to hear about the memories they had when their family lived in our house.

Tommy said that when he was young he was never allowed in the living room because that was his grandparents area and that was out of limits to children. There are large pocket doors between the living room and dining room that the grandparents used, but are now sealed back into the wall and the openings have been sealed over. They told us about watching their grandmother sitting by the dining room windows and mending.

Tommy said that before they lived in our house they lived on the N/E corner of Spring St. and the alley between Prospect and the railroad track. I also remember that the Smith family used to live there when I went to Highgrove Elementary School with Carol Smith.

Later that same house was owned by Russell Grecian who was evicted by the county for all of the code enforcement violations. The house was torn down and a few years ago a modular home was moved in and another house was built on the north end of Russel Grecian's old property.

A couple of days later we had another vehicle pull up in front of our house. This time it was a vehicle from Riverside Mission Florists bringing fresh flowers from the Ross family showing their appreciation for our hospitality.

I was asked to escort Pat Boone in the celebrity parade in 2004 because I was just finishing rebuilding my 1958 Corvette and Pat Boone used to have a 1958 Corvette when he had his television show. They wanted a 1958 Corvette for him to ride in in the parade so they called me.

And with only 42 miles on my Corvette, testing the car up and down Spring St., I was honored to have him riding in my Corvette in the parade and we had a really good time! We

The Television and newspapers had his songs playing on the stereo and he was waving to everyone. He thought it was funny when I asked him to move his lips to his songs that were playing.

> So what does this have to do with "Bridgegate"?

> He told me that once when he was driving across the George Washington Bridge in his brand new 1958 Corvette, the motor died and it created a tremendous traffic jam on this same bridge. He said that his new 1958 Corvette had just been serviced for him but the mechanic failed to put new engine oil back into the engine and the motor froze up right on the bridge.

> Pat Boone was already famous but he really became famous that day to the people who were stuck behind him on the bridge. He said it was one of his most embarrassing moments.

> His incident probably didn't have anything to do with politics back then but the people stuck behind him in 1958 were probably just as frustrated as people on this same bridge 56 years later.



There is always a survey coming out about the healthiest, most relaxing, most outdoorsy, friendliest place to live. Depending on the survey you read, Bend, Oregon will usually hit the list. There is a huge focus on year-round physical activity. There is hiking, walking, running, climbing, swimming, yoga, bicycling, and on and on. Age is not an issue here either. You will see people of all ages out and about "working it. This is a popular area for people to retire and the city is very friendly with sidewalks all over, bike lanes on nearly every road, and well developed hiking and walking paths all over the city.

It'll be 23 degrees outside, and you will see people running through the snow like they are being chased by a bear. 


Fire Trap!


