Highgrove Traffic Plan

Due to the hundreds of new homes being built in Highgrove, the Highgrove Happening Newspaper has submitted a plan for two new streets that could be constructed on <u>un-used property</u> that will help relieve present and future traffic congestion.

One of the plans is to improve the un-used dirt road called California St. to be a new north/south road between Center St. and Palmyrita Avenue. This new road would be on property that has been abandoned but still owned by the Union Pacific Railroad that goes along the west side of the Highgrove Town Center project of 846 new townhomes.

A few years ago the track was removed by the U P Railroad and recently on August 3, 2021, I received an answer back from the UP Railroad that states: "This property has potential to be sold". (My response back to the UPRR is on P. 5)

Another part of the plan includes a new road that would extend Spring St. westward into the 17 acre property already owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission and connect to the Iowa Ave. Overpass.


To get to the Iowa Ave. Overpass, two railroad grade crosings would have to be built over the Perris Valley Line track that is a branch line that dead ends at Perris with no Metrolink service on week ends.

Building two grade crossings over a track is a lot cheaper and can be done a lot sooner than waiting for an Overpass or Underpass to be built on Center St. which would affect Historical structures and businesses.

No additional property needs to be purchased for the Sprng St. extension because the Riverside County Transportation Commision already spent \$8,625,000.00 for this 17 acre property when they built the Perris Valley Line. But RCTC only needed 62% of the property for the width of the Perris Valley Line track. The remaining 38% or \$5,347,500.00 is just a field of weeds and is needed for Metrolink Station and a new road that would also use the paved road over the arroyo that has never been used since it was built 13 years ago in 2008.



I took this photo over 9 1/2 years ago on Jan. 4, 2012 while the train was moving. This train did not stop along with hundreds of other daily 7 day a week Metrolink trains that go by here every day in both directions. The Highgrove Metrolink Station could be located here that is right next to RCTC's 17 acre property. But for 20 years, RCTC has opposed building a parking lot and Metrolink Station on their 17 acre field. This location is needed for a new road and Metrolink Station now more than ever due to the hundreds of new roof tops.



Extending Spring St. from "HERE" TO









WILL ALLOW A NEW ROAD SO VEHICLES CAN ACCESS THE IOWA OVERPASS WHEN TRAINS BLOCK MAIN ST. AND CENTER STREETS



The above photo shows the 17 acre field owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission that is within the City Limits of Riverside. A road and station are 2 valid reasons why our <u>transportation</u> agency should use their land for <u>transportation</u> purposes. The arrow points to the intersection of Spring St. and Transit Ave. in Highgrove where Spring St. could be extended through RCTC's vacant field left of the telephone poles then turn southward (to the right of the photo) toward the "new/old" road that has never been used that is shown in the photo on the right.



This road was constructed in 2008 when the warehouses were built along Citrus Street but is still blocked off by a pipe barricade shown in the photo below. **That's the Iowa Overpass at the top!** Our County *transportation* agency (RCTC) owns the property that is needed for a **new road** from Spring St. to the Iowa Ave. Overpass and a **Metrolink station**. For 20 years RCTC has opposed using their field for a parking lot and Metrolink Station but a new road and Station are needed on their property now more than ever. There s a 12 foot diameter pipe under this road for future trail use.



This barrier was put into place in 2008 to block off the newly paved road when the road was built because the road behind it only goes to an empty field. The other end of this road is shown in the top right photo. It is time to remove these barriers, build a road to the overpass, build a Metrolink Station, and STOP THE DAILY METROLINK TRAINS THAT PASS BY THIS LOCATION!







This photo was taken from the Iowa Ave. Overpass where the Spring St. extension would connect to Citrus St. at the base of the overpass. Citrus St. goes to the top of the overpass where there is a traffic signal that countrols north/south traffic onto Iowa Avenue. This Metrolink train is headed to Riverside and Oceanside where there are other Metrolink trains to San Diego. Anyone want to take their family to the beach or to the Zoo?





Things You Should Know About Metrolink

Metrolink trains on the IEOC (Inland Empire Orange County) line have gone right through Highgrove since March 4, 1996.

In July 2006, the Orange County Transportation Authority created weekend service on the IEOC.

On July 2016, eight Metrolink trains in each direction went between San Bernardino and Oceanside.

Currently, on Monday thru Friday there are Four Metrolink trains in each direction that go through Highgrove without stopping between San Bernardino, Riverside, and Oceanside.

And **currently**, on Saturday and Sunday there are two Metrolink trains in each direction that go through Highgrove without stopping between San Bernardino, Riverside. and Oceanside.

For 20 years residents from Highgrove and Grand Terrace have requested that a Metrolink station be built on the vacant property right next to the track that the Metrolink trains use.

The Riverside County Transportation Commission owns 17.22 acres of vacant land right next to the track but for 20 years they have refused to build a parking lot and station at Highgrove. From Highgrove it is 7 rail miles to San Bernardino and 3 1/2 rail miles in the other direction to Riverside and a station at Highgrove will not interfere with the Perris Valley Line Metrolink trains because they have different destinations.

When I saw the photo and story of the ancient Giant Sequoias recently saved from a wildfire that reached the edge of Giant Forest in California's Sequoia National Park, I nearly wept from relief. I'm a TREE HUGGER. I won't waffle on it. I freely admit it and have the pictures to prove it. I've been known to cry when I see trees being ripped out. When the old orange groves on Center Street a block up from the elementary school were torn out, I cried for hours. I couldn't stand to see it. I lived right across the street and treasured those trees. My tree hugging credentials are decades old.

When I heard the Giant Sequoias were in peril I was overwhelmed with worry. The Four Guardsmen, a group of sequoias that form a natural entrance to the forest were in great peril. To protect them they were wrapped with fire-resistant material around the bases of the trees and nearby vegetation was cleared by the fire-fighting management team. The sequoias have adapted to fire and benefit from low intensity flames; unfortunately the fires that have been raging in the Pacific Northwest and lower California have been anything but low intensity. A photo (AP) of firefighters posing at the base of the General Sherman Tree wrapped with the protective covering is comical. There's a humongous tree with a huge trunk wrapped with what appears to be a tiny amount of fire protectant. The wrap is higher than the firefighters are tall but it demonstrates the massive scale of these unique and priceless trees.

The Four Guardsmen were discovered in 1919, just over one hundred years ago. (Not to be confused with the Four Guardsmen that are in Mariposa Grove in Yosemite NP). General Sherman tree is the largest tree in the world and is estimated to be 2300 to 2700 years old which doesn't make them near the oldest trees but they are the largest. (The oldest trees is a colony of quaking aspens in Utah with an estimated age of 14,000 to 80,000 years old!)

The Giant Sequoias were saved... this time. Unfortunately other sequoias and groves suffered fire damage but it's too early to have an accurate assessment of the damage. Fingers crossed.

Unfortunately there has been devastating damage from the fires in the western states. Some of the largest fires in modern history have been burning this year and won't go out until the fall and winter rains and snows. Preventing these horrific fires is as complex as the causes. 
More Transportation Methods Revealed Ride the Bus





When Mt. San Jacinto College resumed in-person classes last month, few people were happier than Antonio Yanez. After all, the 29-year-old math and science student had been itching to get back into the classroom for more than a year. "I love being around people so it's been pretty sweet to see my professors and my friends again." What made things even sweeter was the fact that Antonio can get to school for free thanks to an RTA promotion that gives unlimited bus rides to college students and youth 18 and under. "All us students are doing our best to survive so this helps so much," he said. When it comes to survival, Antonio can speak volumes about the subject. Six years ago, a car accident damaged the left side of his body making him unable to drive a car. While Antonio works on recovery, he relies on the bus to get him around. And it's working great. Most days, Antonio catches the Route 31 in Beaumont to get to class and work at the MSJC San Jacinto campus. During the trip to campus, he enjoys chatting with the driver as well as the regulars who ride the route. "My trips aren't just to class," he said. "I use it for just about anything — trips to the mall, to visit friends, physical therapy and work."

Antonio isn't alone. Thousands of other students from colleges like Cal Baptist University, La Sierra University, Moreno Valley College, Mt. San Jacinto College, Norco College, Riverside City College and UC Riverside are also enjoying free rides anywhere RTA buses go, anytime they operate. In fact, during August, RTA buses handled nearly 10,000 student boardings and classes aren't even in full swing yet so that number is expected to climb. As for Antonio, the bus has literally been the vehicle that made his pursuit of higher education possible. "I have big plans," he said. "I want to graduate and become a professor. It's been a tough road, but I'm determined. Where there's a will, there's a way."
