from Arezo Ghiam, the Office Engineer from Hill International, that stated the Dec. 19th date had been cancelled.

Then on Dec. 26, 2013 I asked for the date on the sign to be changed to Jan. 8, 2014 to indicate the opening date of the overpass and ribbon cutting but later she called back and stated that the date of Feb. 14, 2014 will have to be left on the sign because even after the Jan. 8, 2014 dedication there will still be other details such as landscaping left to do and there could be workmen in the area.



24 INJURED AS A RESULT OF UNSAFE SPEED

On Thursday, December 19, 2013, at approximately 2:30 pm, Mr. Jian Fei Duan (male 35, Baldwin Park) was driving a Sina International tour bus northbound on Interstate 15, north of Ontario Avenue, during wet rainy weather. Mr. Duan was traveling at 65 MPH (unsafe speed for roadway conditions) and was unable to maintain control of the bus on the wet roadway. The bus traveled off the roadway, into the center median area. The bus struck the center median guardrail and overturned onto its side, coming to rest blocking the #1 and #2 traffic lanes. Emergency personnel responded from several agencies to include the California Highway Patrol-Riverside Area. A triage area was established to assess and treat injuries to 23 passengers and driver. All passengers were transported by ground ambulance to area hospitals with injuries ranging from minor to moderate. The driver sustained minor injury and was not transported. California Highway Patrol, Inland Division Major Accident Investigation Team responded, conducted an on scene investigation and stored the bus as evidence to conduct a full mechanical inspection. All lanes were reopened at 8:13 PM.

This collision is currently under investigation.

HIGHGROVE SHERIFF REPORT

Dec. 3-16, 2013

Part 1 crimes decreased by 76.9% from 13 to 3 over the past 2 weeks in Highgrove. The total of violent crimes staved the same at 2, homicide stayed the same at 0, rape stayed the same at 0, robbery decreased from 1 to 0, aggravated assault increased by 100% from 1 to 2, property crimes decreased by 90.9 % from 11 to 1, burglary decreased by 100% from 5 to 0, auto theft stayed the same at 0, larceny theft decreased by 83.3% from 6 to 1, arson stayed the same at 0, and vehicle burglary decreased 100% from 1 to 0.


nual Christmas party was started by Barbara and Bob Gauthier. The original party was for children infant to 18 years old but after seven

Eagles Host Foster Children cont. from P. 4

The association was formed some thirty two years ago in an effort to bring together Foster Parents in an organization that could answer any questions, help with problems and in general make the Foster Parents task a little more manageable. The Inland Valley Foster Parents Association has developed a 21 hour Foster Parents training program to comply with the state requirement that each Foster Parent must complete.

Patricia has been there for all thirty two years. Understand that this is not a government function but an association of Foster Parents. Although the state and county work with the association, it is totally independent from the state or any county. Patricia herself has, over the thirty two years, had as many as 500 children pass through her and her husband's home. Many for only a few days while other arrangements could be made to accommodate the children, and many as Foster Children who were cared for by she and her husband.

California Dreaming by Dr. Cynthia Williams

Being a transplanted native Californian I am suffering from shock just like my plants. I miss Highgrove and all my family and friends! I moved to central Oregon nearly three years ago and it is nothing like Highgrove. I knew the change would be dramatic- this little city has about 80,000 people, hundreds, if not thousands, of wild deer, and more dogs per capita that any place I've ever been. It is another planet compared to California. Let me share with you my journey.

A new year. A fresh start. I haven't always looked forward to the calendar rolling over, but sometimes it's just what we need. I have my list of fresh starts to work on. I'm sure you do too. We have 12 months to see if any of them get accomplished!

I have a list of fresh starts I would like to see, not for me, but ones that will benefit all of us.

According to a Gallup Poll done the first week of December 2013, EIGHTY-FIVE PERCENT of Americans "disapprove of the way Congress is handling its job." (12% approve and 3% had no opinion.) This is a historic low. Never has the citizen of these United States had such a low opinion of politicians and the political system. I am not a political person; I prefer to stay out of the fray; I am more of an observer. I try to analyze what makes a politician tick, why does he vote a particular way, and who is influencing him the most. (First tip: follow the money) It's not a very scientific method and probably not very thorough. I am very sure though when a politician is sworn into office in the morning, by the afternoon he or or she is already working to get re-elected. I would like to see a fresh start- with our elected official s working for US. Have them earn their keep. We live out on Mt. Vernon where the curve out to the old dump used to be. We've been bothered by the burros for at least a year. They come on our property at least once a day, at times in herds of 30-35. When they first came around we felt sorry for them & set out barrels of water for them. Since then they have devoured 4 young avocado trees, 2 lemon trees, 1 persimmon tree and are now eating the foliage off our 3 orange trees. They also have eaten many shrubs and foliage. We called animal control. They told us to make our property less attractive and get an air horn, (the donkeys already have made our property less attractive.) My concern

is to keep the burros out of residential areas. They are a threat to drivers as well as themselves as we have already seen 1 donkey killed on the side of the road. Your suggestions of captured and adoption or feeding in rural areas sounds fine.

Annomous: I grew up in Grand Terrace and now live in Highgrove. For the past 11 years me and my wife live on Iowa Ave across from Zorbas. All the years I have lived in this area I did not know about the burros. 





