Highgrove Day a huge success!



There were 86 beautiful cars parked on the grass at the Highgrove Day car show. This one belongs to Byron Matteson, former Mayor of Grand Terrace.

Many people assisted in making the 2009 Highgrove Day on May 9, 2009 a fun time for all ages.

The Highgrove Volunteer Fire Company started the day off with their pancake breakfast at the Norton Younglove Community Center. The rest of the festivities were held in the Highgrove Community Park. Many organizations were involved in the planning stages including the Riverside County Economic Development Agency, Family Service Association, Highgrove Pony Baseball, Highgrove Volunteer Fire Company, Supervisor Ashley's office and the Highgrove Happenings Newspaper.

Since Ardie and I were mainly in charge of the car show portion I would like to thank those who helped us with the car show and the band. Originally there were no funds available to have a stage or a band but we asked for help and the community (and other communities) responded.

Warren Carter from Grand Terrace donated the use of his 40' flatbed trailer that we used for a stage. He also delivered the flatbed to the park because it takes a 5th wheel connection (goose neck) to move the trailer. When he delivered it, the 40' by 40' canopy was not set up yet so we had to get another vehicle with a goose neck to back it in under the canopy after the canopy was put up. Thanks to Brad and Debbie Pierce, we used their truck to back the trailer under the canopy. Don Ritz owner of Fair Price Carpet in Highgrove donated a roll of colored burlap that

was used as a skirt that hung off of the trailer and covered the deck and rear railing. Mark Boone of the Champion Lumber Co. donated enough 2 X 4's to allow us to make a railing across the back so no one would fall off the rear of the stage.

The Rialto Lion's club and Dan Hirtz let us use 8 round tables and 32 chairs that were placed just outside the canopy area in addition to the round tables and chairs that were already under the canopy that were set up by the E.D.A.. We rented 8 umbrellas from Party Plus in Redlands to go with the round tables that were outside the canopy to provide additional shade.

The T. M. Cobb Company in Highgrove has supported our event for many years. They gave us a \$350.00 donation and this money along with the money collected from car show entry fees allowed us to buy the trophies, T-Shirts and supplies for flyers and entry forms, and pay the band. Each car that was entered received a free Highgrove T-Shirt that has our Highgrove logo on the front and a 1916 Highgrove citrus label on the back. Mickey Schultz of Traffic Control Service on the west side of the freeway at Columbia donated the use of 10 orange traffic cones and Jim Benson my friend from Grand Terrace used his truck to haul things around for

We had originally planned to use a 16' X 8' hay wagon donated by Don Ritz as a stage for our band the "Highgrove Barn Stormers" but our friends

from the hi desert that play at the Eagles Club in Highgrove were able to come down and play so our small band ended up with 8 people on the 40' stage. We thank Jason Wondolleck of the Johnson Tractor Company, the Caterpillar dealer on E. La Cadena Dr., for donating and delivering the large generator for powering the band. It was nice and quiet and the Weinerschnitzel Weiner wagon even turned off their generator and used power from ours because it was much quieter. Ardie, John Stahley and I would like to thank PJ; lead guitar, Carl; lead guitar, Mel; bass and Jimmy; steel guitar from the high desert and Don; drums from Redlands for coming and playing with us. As you can see there were many people involved in this event.

After it was over we took everything back to our house using Jim Benson's pick-ups and Mike Bigelow's van. Mike was my neighbor when I lived in Grand Terrace. Jim was able to leave the generator hooked up to his truck in my yard overnight so we could take it back on Monday. We all crashed on the patio and ordered pizza. I missed the pancake breakfast because I was checking in cars for the car show and missed the hot dog lunch because of playing in the band and I was looking forward to having pizza. Just as the pizza was delivered I received a call from Katie Gers from the Economic Development Agency who wanted the flatbed moved so they could take the canopy down. Unfortunately both





Meeting with Juan Perez, County Director of Transportation

After several weeks I was able to get a meeting with Juan Perez who is very busy overseeing transportation issues in Riverside County.

On May 21, 2009 I met with him and Richard Fairhurst, Senior Transportation Planner to discuss several issues that are directly connected to Highgrove. Among the items discussed were the Pigeon Pass Corridor, a new north/south road through Highgrove, installing the Highgrove Logo on all new street signs or those being replaced, changing street addresses to east Center St. and east Spring St. in-

stead of changing the name of Center and Spring streets to Old Highgrove Trail and Blue Mountain Drive. The Pigeon Pass Corridor was explained in our April issue and stated the reason why the new road should not connect to Center St. and should connect to Main Street instead.

I few weeks ago I gave Mr. Perez a copy of a power point program Ardie and I made explaining and showing how a Center St. connection would not be good for Highgrove.

At the meeting on May 21, 2009 I

On May 15, 2009 committee members Melanie Zimmermann and I (R. A. "Barney" Barnett) were taken on a tour of developments that have been completed or under construction by Workforce Homebuilders. Tony Mize and his son Alex, and Darryl Brown showed us various locations such as the J. E. Wall Victoria Manor in Riverside, The Mission Village Senior Complex in Glen Avon, and 3 locations in Rancho Cucamonga: Monterey Village and Learning Center, Villaggio at Route 66, and the Mountainside Learning Center.

Workforce Homebuilders want to build 84 apartment units south of the new library. The new Highgrove library is

planned on Center St. just west of Michigan Ave. and the apartments would be located south of the library behind the homes on the west side of Michigan Avenue. The committee reported back to the Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council at the monthly meeting that was held on May 27, 2009.

Kirk Wallace from A W Properties West has also attended our meetings in regard to building 150 additional apartment units near the same location that is between Michigan Ave. and Garfield, Center and Spring Street.

As stated in our previous issue, both of these developers are interested in what

gave him power point packets and letters for distribution to the following cities and/or agencies involved in making the decision about connection to Center St. or Main Street. Copies were supplied for: San Bernardino County, City of Grand Terrace, City of Moreno Valley, City of Colton, City of Redlands, City of San Bernardino, City of Riverside, Riverside County Transportation Commission, and San Bernardino Association of Governments. Supervisor Ashley has already received his copy and the copy for Loma Linda was given to Adam Rush of Riverside County Planning at our meeting on April 22, 2009.

The goal of distributing these visual presentations is to educate the surrounding cities who are discussing the di-


rection the Pigeon Pass Corridor will take so that they can see the impact it will have when a road is built to handle traffic from Moreno Valley through Highgrove.


Hopefully this information will be given to the representatives before their next meeting. Mr. Perez did not know when that meeting would be held but said he would forward the information to the proper people.


Another important item discussed was the extension of Michigan Ave. southward across the field and arroyo and connect to Palmyrita Avenue. If Michigan were extended it would allow a straight road all the way from Barton Road in Grand Terrace, through Highgrove and southward to the base of Sugarloaf Mountain at Columbia Avenue. Columbia Ave. is where there will be an overpass over the BNSF RR tracks that is now under construction.

the public concerns or interests are, and they are willing to listen to suggestions about the use of this vacant property.

According to information provided by the Riverside County Economic Development Agency, "Highgrove has 1,550 acres of vacant land". Many of these acres are ready to build on, such as the Spring Mountain Ranch



Places to go, things to do, people to


How many of us have said-"I've lived here for 25 years and I have never been to that [fill in the blank]!" This column is to introduce you to what is in your own backyard and show you what you are missing. Then maybe you will want to go explore for yourself.

Highgrove Library, Highgrove, California

Right in front of Highgrove Elementary School is our Highgrove Branch Library; which is part of the Riverside County Library system.

My first memory of the library in Highgrove was in a little white house on Center Street near the Methodist Church. I was in elementary school and the library was my favorite place to go. Later the library moved to the former grocery building at 937 Center Street across from the church. It was a nice big space with lots of books. In my senior year of high school I got my dream job as an assistant at that library. I worked there for one year before moving on.

Our library staff of Louise Gutierrez the Branch Manager, Christina Torres, Assistant Librarian, and Joseph Garcia, Page, is very knowledgeable and capable of assisting you with whatever you need. Libraries have evolved considerably since I was an assistant. Books are still the star and there is a great variety at our branch. Spanish language, bilingual books for children, and large print books are available. There is an emphasis on books for students, but there is a great selection of hardback and paperback books for adults.



Books are the core of any library but libraries have become a destination with so many exciting services; some of the services available through the Riverside County Library System to patrons with a library card might surprise you...

You can get *any* book you want through our library. In the library you can access book listings by title, author or subject. You can also access book listings from the comfort of your own home. Find a book you want? The computer will tell you if the book is available in our library or you can reserve it and it will be delivered to our library for you to pick up there. This is a convenient feature I have utilized many times. Need to renew your book? No need to come into the library; you may renew your book online.

The library has a photocopier ($15 \normalfont{pst}$ a page) and computers for patrons to use. You may print for *free* 10 pages each visit ($10 \normalfont{pst}$ a page after you use your 10 pages) any material you want. Louise told me some students bring in their jump drive and print off their homework. Some patrons like to print off material they have found on the web as well.

Books on Tape have been around for many years. Cassette tapes are still available at our branch as well as CDs and a couple of hundred are available. They have a new format that is so cool! Right now 10 books are available as MP3s and many more are available when you request books from other libraries. The book comes loaded on its own battery operated dedicated-to-one-book MP3 player. It is about the size of a pager and very light and portable. You use your own earphones and the checkout is for two weeks.

Pearl's PicksTM is a well thought out list of recommended reading from Nancy Pearl, a regular commentator for National Public Radio and KUOW in Seattle. Ms Pearl is very popular (a "Librarian Action Figure" was modeled in her likeness) and thousands of book lovers look to her for her picks of "what do I read next?" She is the author of "Book Lust" (2003) and five other books about what to read. If you are stuck on what to read next, you can click her link and get one recommendation or ten of them!

Adult Literacy Program; their mission is "To help English-speaking adults improve their literacy skills so they may fulfill their personal goals and take advantage of opportunities as lifelong learners." This free program is available with one-to-one tutoring with a program designed to meet each student's individual needs. The students meet twice a week at a nearby library for a total of about three hours a week.

BookLetters® offers book referrals and information on hundreds of authors, find quality books for your children, or

learn about new books covering topics that interest you. BookLetters is easy to access online or in the library and you may also sign up for BookLetters' email newsletter service.

Auralog Tell Me More® is a wonderful FREE service where anyone can learn a foreign language online at home: Dutch, English, French, German, Italian and two Spanish languages. This service can be accessed from any computer anytime.

Live Homework Help® from Tutor.com™ is available to help students with their school assignments. Have a history question? Have an English assignment? Have a question about Biology?

ReferenceUSA[™] is the "No. 1 source of information for businesses and people for researchers, students, job seekers and government agencies.

And one more helpful item-there is a page of links to dozens of other sources including the libraries in the Inland Library System, Government Resources, and Library Related Resources.

\$17,000 of Unclaimed money waiting for Highgrove Residents

Being a member of the Highgrove Municipal Advisor Committee (MAC), I'm always thinking of ways to help improve the community in which I live and how to improve services for residents. The other day a fellow MAC Member e-mailed me a link to a NBC 4 news story highlighting the billions of dollars the State of California is holding for residents as unclaimed money. The state of California has over \$5 billion owed to people or businesses. That's \$5 billion. with a "B". The money comes from banks, insurance companies, former employers, ex-landlords and others, who supposedly can't locate the owners of the money.

The NBC Investigative Reporter Joel Grover spotlighted how much of this money is owed to local governments. According to his investigation, the Colton Public Library in San Bernardino County is owed over \$9,500. Think of what you could do with an extra \$9,500.

Like the rest of businesses, my employer has cut spending during this economic down turn and I was curious if my company was owed money. I did a search on the FREE public website, http:/ /scoweb.sco.ca.gov/UCP/ and I found that my employer was owed almost \$1,000.

Now my curiosity was really peaked. I was wondering how many of my friends and family members were owed money that they never knew about. I did a search using my family name, and I found that my mom was owed \$50 from Hewlett-Packard for a computer rebate back in 2004. Apparently Hewlett-Packard only had a partial address and the rebate check was returned to them and they eventually turned the money over to the state of California. My grandmother has a \$25 insurance premium refund from Allstate Insurance Company that is from over 15 years ago.

I was curious to see how many Highgrove residents were owed money. I searched the site using Highgrove as the city and 82 names appeared and those residents or ex-residents are owed over \$17,000. While many of the refunds average just under \$100, there are a few that are over \$1,500.

Much of the money is in the form of forgotten savings accounts, money market cds, insurance premium overpayments, court settlements, and securities but there was also money from escrow accounts, unclaimed paychecks and 1 share of stock.

I have included a list of all of the names that are owed money and were associated with Highgrove. If you or someone you know is on this list, please go to the websites listed below and follow the instructions for claiming your money. The website has all of the information for submitting claims and proving that you are the person who the money is owed to or that you are the next of kin if the person is deceased. There are services that will help you find your lost money but they're not necessary and just charge you money for something you can easily do yourself.
