The documentary "One Bridge to the Next", which gives an inside look on Jim Wither's Operations Safety Net program in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania will be played on the last night. His documentary gives an inside look at the meaning of community and the connections that can be made by working with groups like Operation Safety Net and Doctors Without Walls- Santa Barbara Street Medicine. On Saturday May 7, 2011 the pancake breakfast started inside the Norton Younglove Community Center at 7:00 am at the same time that the gates opened for the car show on the north end of the Highgrove Community Park. Other vendors and cars entered the park and the opening ceremony was held at 9:00 am with welcome comments by R. A. "Barney" Barnett and Riverside County Supervisor Ashley.

As long as the bad guy did what he was told, the dog stayed by the Sheriff but when the bad guy did something wrong or didn't obey the Sheriff, the dog went after the padded arm of Deputy Colbert. The dog will stay attached to the bad guy until the Sheriff gives the dog the release command. All this time, the dog is wagging his tail because he is trained to consider this as a

The car show awards were at 2.00pm under the south canopy and 26 awards were handed out to the winners. By Saturday evening everything was taken down and the park was clean except for the cardboard trash containers provided by Waste Management.

On Saturday morning I was grateful to have 2 scout leaders, Paul Kaneski and Diane McLaughlin who I had never met, volunteer to assist at the entry gate with the show cars and vendors when I had to leave. Later, I was very happy to see Paul win a floor jack and

In 1994, illegal immigrants cost California taxpayers almost \$8 billion in providing them with an education, health benefits and the policing of them entering the State and almost \$11 billion per year since them. Even I, as a researcher, was astounded when I saw these figures. And, to make matters worse, it will still cost this much or more in future years. So, we should ask, who has the authority to shut the gate on these illegal immigrants?

In demonstrating where most of the tax dollars go, over \$8 billion goes to educating the children of these aliens. And our education leaders can't understand why our classrooms are overcrowded? Give me a break! We also shell out another \$1.5 billion to incarcerating these aliens. Farmers insist that paying an alien for working is cheap labor but it is almost bankrupting the State. Proposition 194 set a limit on the liability these aliens may cause. Yet, state, county and local governments, blatantly ignored the voters' wishes and continued to provide a wide spectrum of benefit to the aliens at the tune of \$1,200 per family. No one can estimate the cost at the cash register when you buy products that were once handled by illegal aliens. Don't try to grow your own vegetables because it will cost you more for the seeds and fertilizer to grow them than buying them from the grocery store. I know firsthand, I tried and failed.

It seems there is no adaptable solution to this problem but with many of us working more than 40 hours per week to just survive, it will continue to hit us in the wallet.

In conclusion, one of the first steps should be to secure the borders of our country to those who enter our country illegally. The next step of what to do with the illegal aliens who are already here is also a major political issue that is growing every day.

Investing beyond Short-term CDs Article 7 — May 30, 2011

Many people depend on certificates of deposit (CDs) to provide extra income. Yet CD rates have been fairly low for a while. In recent months, in fact, one-year CDs were paying about 0.5%, two-year CDs topped out at around 1%, and five-year CDs paid in the 2% to 2. 3% range. Those rates are scanty enough, but they can seem even lower in an economic environment marked by rising food and gas prices.

Before you consider alternatives, keep in mind that CDs still offer a key advantage: safety of principal. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) typically insures CDs up to \$250,000. And since CDs are relatively short-term in nature, you don't have to worry about locking away that money for long periods of time. So there can be a place for CDs in the fixed-income portion of your portfolio.

However, during times such as these, you might consider looking at additional options, keeping in mind that, when seeking greater income, you'll likely be taking on more risk. Let's consider a few alternatives:

buy fixed annuities to supplement their retirement income. But most annuities also allow you to take up

to 10% of your account value each year without penalty. Plus, the interest rate you receive on a fixed annuity may be more competitive than that currently paid by a CD. Keep in mind, though, that annuities are not backed by FDIC insurance, and any guarantees are backed solely by the paying ability of the insurance company. Additionally, early or excessive withdrawals may be subject to penalties. If you believe a fixed annuity might be appropriate for your situation, speak with your financial advisor.

• Bond ladders — If appropriate for your situation, you can potentially gain extra income through a strategy known as a bond "ladder." To build a ladder, you buy several bonds with varying maturities short-, intermediate- and long-term. Once you've constructed your ladder, you could gain some advantage in various interest rate environments. When market rates are low, you'll still have your longer-term bonds earning higher interest rates. And when market rates rise, you can reinvest your maturing shortterm bonds at the higher rates. But if you need income in addition to your regular interest payments, you • Fixed annuities — Many people can get it from the maturing bonds. Unlike CDs, however, bonds are not covered by FDIC insurance and are subject to credit risks. Bonds are also subject to interest rate risk: When interest rates rise, bond prices generally fall, and you may lose some or all of your principal if you sell your bond prior to maturity. But by holding your bonds until maturity, you can avoid loss of principal, assuming the issuer doesn't default.

• Dividend-paying stocks — Some companies have paid — and increased — their stock dividends for many years now. If you don't need the dividends to boost your cash flow, you can reinvest them to help boost your ownership stake.

However, companies can reduce or discontinue their dividends at any time, and since stock prices fluctuate, you risk losing some or all of your principal.

By exploring alternatives to short-term CDs, you may find other appropriate investments that may better position you to reach your financial goals - so look around to see what's available in the financial marketplace.
