
What is it?



High hopes for Highgrove!

What a wonderful day we had at the recent Highgrove Day. We had about a hundred cars entered in the car show. These cars are among the most beautiful, not to mention most valuable cars around. The entertainment was, as always, first rate. I loved the amazingly talented yo yo guys. The taco stand had the serious real thing and the senior center lovingly served breakfast for all. While I was there, it occurred to me that our little community has a very good present, and a great future ahead.

Soon, maybe this fall, models homes will precede the building and selling of homes on the vast tract of land in Pigeon Pass. Potentially thousands of homes, can more than double the population of Highgrove. That new population will support every sort of service; restaurants, dry cleaners, beauty shops, supermarkets, dentists, doctors, and hopefully a golf course. Very importantly, Highgrove has a lot of vacant, undeveloped land.

We now have a brand new high school across the street in Grand Terrace to support this new influx of residents and there is a plan to build a new elementary school in the Spring Mountain Ranch area.

Highgrove has easy access to the 215 Freeway, and there are both easy on and off ramps. The opportunity exists for businesses to locate near the freeway and it's approaches.

There are existing institutions here that nurture and give the community soul and personality. The Eagles Aerie on La Cadena is a gathering place that houses a number of charitable giving groups, and a hall for weddings, funerals, receptions and everything in between. The old Methodist Church has been there since 1890 and Sandals Church at the end of Palmyrita Ave, although a rather recent addition to the area, is serving the spiritual needs of many thousands.

There are businesses in Highgrove that have been here for, not years or decades, but for generations. Fair Price Carpets comes to mind. They have been in Highgrove since 1957, and is now managed by the third generation. My Barber Shop on Center Street, has been there seemingly forever.

Highgrove has plenty of room to grow and we should be aware that careful planning is essential to the success of it's future growth.

Congressman Takano invited to Highgrove & Marlborough Ave.!

Copy of letter to:

Congressman Mark Takano May 8, 2014

I received your letter this afternoon about the future Metrolink service on the Perris Valley Line.

If I told you that the Highgrove station is \$19,145,310.00 cheaper than the Marlborough Ave. location, and building the station at Highgrove will not stop the progress of the Perris Valley Line, would you come to Highgrove?

I am inviting you to come to Highgrove and I will only take 1 hour of your time to see what has not been shown to you.

There was an article in the Local edition of the Press Enterprise today (May 8, 2014) that I would like for you to read. But here is some information that I sent to the Press Enterprise that was not printed:

Independent study requested about Metrolink Station location!

It's not what you know or think, it's what you can prove, and I can prove that Highgrove is the best location for a Metrolink station due to location, costs, destinations, and public support."

"In the Press Enterprise on Feb. 15, 2009, the RCTC Executive Director stated: "We have to put the stops where they serve the most people". But if this is true, how could Marlborough Ave. be the best place to serve the most people when there has not even been one Metrolink train that has passed by Marlborough Ave. and there have been over

20,000 Metrolink trains that have passed by Highgrove only one mile away?"

"On July 15, 2006 Metrolink trains going through Highgrove increased from 5 days a week to 7 days a week. All that has been needed is a station platform and a parking lot at Highgrove but RCTC opposes using their location to stop the existing Metrolink trains that go between the two counties."

"The Highgrove location has four purposes: (1) It could be used to connect the two railroads, (2) a station platform on the west side, (3) a station platform on the east side and (4) a common parking lot in between the two station platforms". "RCTC paid \$8,625,000.00 for the vacant land between the two railroads at Highgrove but why are they only charging \$3,277,500.00 to the Perris Valley Line? This is only 38% of the actual cost they paid for the property at Highgrove."

"RCTC has labeled the other (62%) which is \$5,347,500.00 as 'an uneconomic remnant' but this is the exact same property that has been needed for a parking lot at Highgrove for the last 13 years."

"RCTC has \$5,347,500.00 they already have invested in Highgrove property that they don't need but could be used for a parking lot. They paid \$8,146,000.00 for the vacant land at Marlborough Ave. and it will cost \$5,651,810.00 to build a station at Marlborough. Avenue. This investment totals: **\$19,145,310.00**. " *Cont. on P. 11* "POINT OF ROCKS" selected by RCTC for Metrolink station!



Marlborough Ave. on the Perris Valley Line is where rocks are being removed and new dirt being brought in.

RCTC owns both the Highgrove property and the Marlborough property above and they are only one mile apart! "In the Press Enterprise on Feb. 15, 2009, Ann Mayer, RCTC Executive Director stated: "We have to put the stops where they serve the most people". But the Marlborough Ave. location shown above, has not had any passenger train service since the steam engine days! And only one mile away, right next to RCTC's property at Highgrove, there have been over **20,000** Metrolink trains that have gone right past the west side of RCTC's property. On July 15, 2006 Metrolink train service through Highgrove was increased from 5 days per week to 7 days a week so this 20,000 figure is a conservative figure because it does not include any 5 day a week Metrolink trains that passed through Highgrove without stoping prior to July 15, 2006.

RCTC bought the Highgrove property so they could build a new curved track to connect the Perris Valley Line to the BNSF main line. But Highgrove could also be used as a station because it already has existing Metrolink trains. The Highgrove station could have been serving commuters between Riverside and San Bernardino Counties for 13 years when requests from the public were first iniated. Written documentation and city resolutions have supported a Highgrove Metrolink Station that date back to 2001 but RCTC refuses to build a station where the people need it and want it. RCTC paid \$8,146,000.00 for the above 9.75 acre "Point of Rocks" before any improvements. The property at Marlborough Ave, should continue to be improved by breaking up the rocks, bringing in new dirt and compacting it, then the property should be sold and the station built at Highgrove!

Request given to Congressman Takano and Senator Roth asking for an "Independent" study to determine the best location for Metrolink station!

I hand delivered the items listed on page 11 plus the following letter to the Marlborough Ave. Formerly known as "POINT OF ROCKS" offices of California State Senator Richard Roth and Congressman Mark Takano in Riverside on May 16, 2014. Here is a copy of that letter:

Gentlemen:

This is a request for an "Independent" study to determine which location is the best location for a Metrolink Station in the Highgrove/ Hunter Park area. "Station Location" and related information would be the only item being considered.

In order to make this an "Independent" study, there should be no influence or connection in the selection of the panel from R. A. "Barney" **Barnett or from the Riverside County Transportation Commission.**

The Riverside County Transportation Commission will be allowed to show why the Metrolink station should be built on RCTC's property at Marlborough Ave. and an equal amount of time will be given to R. A. "Barney" Barnett to show why the station should be built on RCTC's property at Highgrove.

Both locations are already owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission and they are only one mile apart, but Metrolink Station construction has not started at either location.

Funding for the panel could be paid for from local "Measure A" funds that RCTC admits they do not need for the Perris Valley Line construction. The amount available is \$5,347,500.00. A portion of this amount could be used for payment to the panel members if necessary. Federal, State, and Local funds are being used for future commuter rail transportation in this area.

This "Independent" study will not stop the progress of the Perris Valley Line and the grading and compacting of the soil should be continued at Marlborough Avenue. But once the grading is completed, construction of a station should not begin until the "Independent" study is completed. Your response is requested.





Worker killed during demolition of Union Pacific Railroad bridge over Interstate 91 freeway.



A portion of the Union Pacific railroad bridge that was being disassembled over the I-91 freeway in Riverside resulted in the death of a worker who was working on the bridge when it collapsed in the early morning on Sunday May 18, 2014. Okesene Faasalete, age 59 was catapulted to his death when the portion of the bridge he was tethered to fell onto the freeway. The freeway is being widened to add car pool lanes which means that many of the old bridges are too short for the new wider freeway.



Some History of Highgrove

The folks at the UCR Library have begun an "Inland Empire Memories Initiative". The purpose is to collect information and documents which will "identify, preserve, make available, and interpret the rich cultural legacies of the diverse communities of the Inland Empire." An important part of the history of the area obviously began with the birth of Riverside and the development of the citrus industry in Highgrove and Riverside. Joyce, Jerry, Richard and Louise Haight, Joan (Jory) Teplow, and Jean (Jory) Texera, are collecting information about the Everington, Twogood, and Haight family members, and their involvement in the early history of the area. I've attached what I think is an interesting summary of the involvement of some of those family members and of some of the pioneers. When we've finished collecting photographs and other documents of interest, we'll send them to Betty Miller at the UCR Library. Maybe there are still descendants of some of other early Highgrove families who would like to join in the effort, by sending items of interest to Ms. Miller, or by calling her at 951-827-7847.

Joyce (Everington) Anderson of Alta Loma, California and Jerry Everington of Rigby, Idaho were born in Highgrove in the 1930's and attended and graduated from public schools in Highgrove and Riverside, including Highgrove Elementary, University Junior High, Poly High, and Riverside Junior College.

Their father, P.W. Everington, was born in London, England in 1903 and moved to Highgrove in 1921. He owned and operated the Highgrove Market and post office annex for about 16 years, and then owned and operated P.W. Everington & Son playground equipment manufacturing and installation company for about 20 years.

Their mother, Carrie (Haight) Everington was born in 1902 and lived her entire life (93 years) in Highgrove. She married P.W. in 1928 and raised the two children, worked full time in the market, and was very active in the Highgrove First United Methodist Church, where she was a member for 92 years. She was also an active member of the Highgrove School Board for many years.

Carrie's brother, Albert Haight, also lived his entire life (1904 to 1979) in Highgrove, except when he was a Phi Beta Kappa student of architecture at U.C. Berkeley and a U.S. Navy officer during world war II. Albert was an architect who worked many years for the G. Stanley Wilson firm in Riverside. In addition to designing homes and businesses, he designed many schools, hospitals, and churches in Riverside and surrounding communities. Albert and Peter J. Weber were the two young architects who made the Wilson firm architecturally significant, because G. Stanley was simply a successful businessman who was trained by a skilled carpenter and builder, D.J. McLeod. (Additionally, G. Stanley did take correspondence courses in architecture). One of the most historically significant projects which Albert designed was the Rotunda Wing of the Mission Inn, along with a beautiful marble double-staircase connecting the wing with the Spanish Art Gallery.

Near the end of his career, Albert was the Principal Resident Architect during the design and construction of the clock tower and the other original campus buildings for the College of Letters and Science at the University of California at Riverside. He also was "Assistant Chancellor for Management" at UCR from 1960 to 1963.

Carrie, Albert, and a sister (Esther Haight Jory) were the children of John Peter Haight (1874 to 1913) who was born in Three Oaks, Michigan and moved to Riverside in 1888 and married Alice Lucina Twogood in 1900. John Peter Haight was co-owner of "La Porte & Haight Builders" of Riverside.

He was one of the eight children of Albert Clayton Haight (1843 to 1911) and Cather Dakin. Albert Clayton Haight was born in Cohocton, New York and moved to Riverside in 1886, In 1887, he moved to Grand Terrace and became a successful citrus grower in Grand Terrace, Highgrove, and Riverside. He later built a large home on Van buren Ave. Albert Clayton Haight's father was Peter Haight (1786 to 1844) who was a prosperous farmer in Cohocton, and soldier in the war of 1812.

Albert C. Haight's eleven brothers and sisters included Alonzo Dewitt Haight (1834 to 1913) who was a citrus grower in Riverside beginning in 1876, in addition to being a teacher, surveyor, and merchant. He built his home on 40 acres on Palm Avenue. Another brother was Ira C. Haight (1830 to 1897) who moved from New York to Riverside in 1875. He was co-owner of "Haight Fruit Company" of Red-He was also the original Street Superintendent of Riverside, beginning in 1883, and the first Postmaster of Redlands beginning in about 1889.

The Haight family in America can be traced back to Simon Hoyt (1590 to 1659) and his first wife, Deborah. They were from Upway, Dorsetshire, England. They arrived on the "Abigail", which was one of the 12 ships in the Higginson Fleet which landed in Salem, Massachusetts in 1628. Over the generations, the name changed from Hoyt to Hait to Hayt and finally to Haight in 1766.

Joyce's, Jerry's, Richard Haight's, and Joan and Jean Jory's grandmother, Alice Lucina (Twogood) Haight was the daughter of Albert James Twogood and the niece of Adoniram Judson (A.J.) Twogood and Daniel C. (D.C.) Twogood. All three of the men were active in the early development of Riverside. Adoniram Judson Twogood accompanied J. W. North to Riverside in the fall of 1870 to assist in the selection of the property which would become the "Southern California Colony", which would later become Riverside. After about four weeks, he returned to Iowa; then, he returned with his family in June of 1871. He built a home on five ares on 14th Street at Mulberry. A.J. was active in both citrus and real estate development, but surely his most important contribution was in teaming with Stephen Herrick and Mathew Gage to bring water to the barren lands of Riverside and East Riverside (Highgrove).

D.C. Twogood arrived in Riverside in November of 1870, immediately after the signing of the purchase agreement for the land making up the "colony". He first built a small home in East Riverside (Highgrove), and soon thereafter built a larger home on Prospect Avenue near Mulberry, in Riverside. Both A.J. and D.C. were co-owners of "Twogood and Cutter" a business dealing in orange and lemon trees and located in the "Rowell Block" near 9th and Main.

Albert James Twogood (Joyce's, Jerry's, Richard's, Joan's and Jean's great grandfather) moved from Bloomington, Illinois to Riverside in 1888 and married Sarah Coffin. He, too, became very active in the citrus industry and built a large home on Palmyrita in East Riverside.

California Dreaming

It's almost time to plant my small garden, pull out the BBQ, and dust off the lounge chairs. It's trying to get warmer here in Oregon. Believe me, it is a struggle. We have warm days then cold nights; tepid days and freezing nights. This time of some painful memories. The 18th year, if we get a really warm day, it is still really cold at night, so I still have my electric blanket on the bed and my flannel nightie and fuzzy slippers out to wear. It's too early to pack away the coats, scarves, and gloves for the very few months it is warm enough to go without.

Some of you may recall that I am a Master Gardener, having trained through the University of California Agriculture Extension Office at Riverside. When I moved to Oregon a small amount of that knowledge transferred to this new climate. Even composting requires a different approach as we don't get the heat that can be helpful to move a pile along. I haven't planted here yet as the frost danger is not over until at least June 1st. If I were in Highgrove it would almost be too hot to grow any greens. Starting from seed for all but the smallest plants is pointless as the growing season is about thirty minutes long. I tried using three and four inch starter pots but they didn't local Sara's Project organization.

grow fast enough before the frost. This year I may try the six inch pots to see if I can get something to harvest; otherwise I will stick to growing mesclun mix, spinach, radishes and herbs.

This May was a month with of May was the one year anniversary of when I had my mastectomy; I started chemotherapy July 1st last year. I am still getting "chemo" and overall I have been doing remarkably well. My hair is coming back- it's about an inch long, thick and curlier than it used to be. Over all, I cannot complain. The support system here for cancer patients is exceptional. I have talked to other cancer patients who came from Portland, the California Bay Area, and Southern California who tell me there is nothing like the services and support system we have here in Bend, Oregon. A new multi-million dollar cancer treatment facility is opening the end of this month which will be one of the best in the country. There are several fund raising activities each year as well with the funds going to support the groups and programs for cancer patients. One event is unique to Bend. It is called "Heaven Can Wait" to support the

Sara's Project was founded to promote early detection and treatment of breast cancer as well as support services for women dealing with breast cancer. I benefited from this organization the first day I went to visit my surgeon. I was given a box tied with a pink ribbon and inside was a DVD produced by women who are cancer survivors, written information, local made lotion, a scarf, a pink bracelet, a bookmark, and other very thoughtful items to help and comfort during surgery and treatment. Since my surgery I get a call about once a month from a nurse navigator who checks to make sure I am doing well and to ask if I have any needs or questions. Over all, I feel very fortunate to be here at this phase in my life and I am so thankful to the volunteers and those who make it all possible.

The 29th of May marked a year since my dear brother Randy passed away from brain cancer. Brain cancer is

one of the most devastating cancers one can experience. It's terribly frightening, physically debilitatingboth from the tumor growth and the effects of surgery and radiation and the side effects of medications like chemotherapy and steroids, plus it takes a large toll on the patient and his or her family. The type my brother had- Glioblastoma Multiform- it's the most virulent. It is highly aggressive, almost always fatal with a life expectancy after diagnosis given as mere months and not expected to be years. My brother Randy fought for 19 months after his diagnosis. He was a true warrior who won many battles but ultimately lost the war. Losing our brother to this awful disease was a tragedy; he is missed dearly by his whole family. When you see a gray bracelet it is in recognition of Brain Cancer Awareness. Please consider donating to cancer research.

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

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
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
