for the last 8 1/2 years.

Their Environmental Impact Report was recently made available for public comment and a public hearing was held in Riverside on April 14, 2010. Verbal comments were received at this meeting but written comments are needed no later than May 24, 2010. At the public meeting I spoke under public comments and pointed out several unfair instances that RCTC has done to ignore what the people in the entire surrounding area have asked for in regard to a Metrolink stop in Highgrove.

Terrace and the city of Loma Linda were turned into the staff for distribution to the RCTC commissioners. These 30 copies set in a box at the RCTC offices for 14 months before they were given to the commissioners. In another incident on April 4, 2007, SANBAG, the transportation agency in San Bernardino, decided to wait until the results of an independent study of the Highgrove Metrolink location was completed by SCAG (Southern California Associated Governments) before supporting the Highgrove station but Metrolink cont. on P. 4



On Mar 26, 2010 a deputy stopped a vehicle at the corner of Iowa Ave. X Center St., reference a vehicle code violation. While speaking with the driver the deputy noticed a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from the driver. The driver admitted that he had been drinking but felt OK to drive. 

on the following day April 5, 2007 the RCTC Ex-executive Director at that time, Eric Haley, went to Los Angeles and convinced SCAG not to do a study of the Highgrove location. The SCAG representative from the city of Grand Terrace, Lee Ann Garcia, could not attend and asked for a continuance but the Executive Director and Robin Lowe, RCTC member from Hemet, stopped the independent study. (Tape recording available). These instances were things that happened in the past but I also pointed out how Highgrove continues to be ignored even now!

The flyer that announced the April 14, 2010 public hearing where I was speaking stated that the EIR (Environmental Impact Report) was available for viewing at the RCTC office and 4 libraries in Riverside County. The libraries listed were Riverside, Moreno Valley, Perris and Woodcrest.

The Highgrove library did not receive a copy of the EIR for the Perris Valley Line!

I pointed out that Highgrove has had a library since 1893 and the present one was built in 1981 and we are building a new library scheduled to open at the end of this year (Photos on P. 1). The Highgrove library is also in Riverside County and is only <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> mile from the Highgrove station we have been requesting. Also, it is only <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile from Grand Terrace which would be convenient for their review.

I then read from their flyer which stated: "The publics primary concerns throughout this process have been safety, noise and rail traffic." There was no mention of the contro-

versy over the station location that has been the focus of the surrounding cities and communities for the last 8 1/2 years! (At this point I really wanted to ask: "Where have you been?!!!!" but I was running out of time for my 3 minutes at the soap box.)

I gave each of the 35 commissioners a colored map showing where the people want a station and a red X at the RCTC location.

Many people feel that it makes no sense at all to build a station where there are no commuter trains when only 1/2 mile away there are commuter trains 7 days a week. And RCTC has never been able to offer sound reasoning for building a station at Palmyrita Avenue. We have challenged their consultant remarks on our website under the title of "13 reasons".

I am sure that my comments were not well received but every statement I made was the truth and was backed up by written documents I presented to the clerk of the board to add to the EIR to show to the Federal Transit Administration, Senators and members of the State Assembly that the RCTC plan is a waste of our tax money!

# Main St. residents concerned about widening south side of street!

On April 7, 2010 a special meeting was arranged to address the concerns of the residents on the south side of Main Street. As you know the south side is in Riverside County and the north side is in San Bernardino County. There are plans to widen the street to 4 lanes in this area due to the construction of the new Grand Terrace High School. But instead of widening the street on the north side where there were no homes, a plan was made to widen the south side where there are many homes on Main Street. There are homes east of Michigan Ave. and from Michigan Ave. westward to the UP railroad track near Taylor Street. This will result in residential property being reduced on the frontage along Main St., and the people are not happy!

The Riverside County Transportation Director, Juan Perez, and 3 mem-

bers of his department walked each property and met with the residents to discuss how much property is needed from their frontage to widen the road. Residents were shown with a tape measure where the curb and sidewalk would be located.

Some properties could have a "hammer head" turn around point. One concern was that many of the residents will not have room for parking and only be able to turn eastward out of their driveways if a center divider is installed.


After listening to the residents, plans have been altered to considered making the eastbound lane only a single lane to allow parking their vehicles in front of their homes.

W. corner of Center St. and Iowa Ave. were demolished on April 8, 2010 to remove these unsightly structures that were located near the entrance to Highgrove from the northbound freeway. The Riverside County Economic Development Agency has already demolished an old structure on the S. E. corner of Center and Iowa Ave. that was originally a .25 cent car wash years ago. And the N. E. corner of this same intersection has been improved by the façade program offered by the Riverside County Economic Development Agency that included a new frontage that is now Fix it Right Auto Repair. The wrought iron fencing on this corner was installed a couple of years ago. Other improvements to this area have been made to: Reliable Tire Co., La Frontera Market, Iowa Ave. Market, Hughes Appliance Building, Good news Church, and Tacos El Jr. #6 restaurant. Also scheduled for improvements are Chris' Burgers and Ortiz Bakery. The Economic Development Agency is cleaning up our community!

Chevron gasoline service station and Panda Express on this property. Years ago it was a service station operated by the late Bob Shearer.






### **DEVILS DEN** by Dennis Wilds

#### THE CARDBOARD CONNOIS-SEUR

During the part of the year that I wore shoes you could count on my back pockets being full of cardboard. I used the cardboard to cover the holes in my shoe soles, thus sparing my exposed socks wear and tear. The shoes may well have survived their previous owners in their trickle down journey to me. Their paper thin leather soles afforded some protection from the three pronged stickers called goat heads found everywhere in the San Joaquin Valley. Quite honestly, by the end of summer my feet were tough enough to handle the stickers anyway but schools required shoes so I wore them. Once, I couldn't find one of my shoes so I went to school barefooted and lasted most of the day til the teacher noticed. She sent me to the nurse and she found me some temporary shoes from a box of clothes, but I was warned to come back the next day with shoes on or stay home. For a kid, shoes are just a nuisance with


laces that come undone or break or get frazzled ends that won't thread through the eyelets anymore. Then there is the issue of the socks that creep down toward your toes and worry the hell out of you. I'm not even going to get into the worrisome issue of under wear without good elastic and the effects of exercise and gravity. I would wear my socks til they got stiff enough to stay up on their own, partially solving sock slippage. Sometimes the old shoe would separate from the soles at the toe end of the shoe making it look like it had lips. You could drag the front of the shoe making it flip flop, adding rhythm to your step. This, in turn, had the disadvantage of collecting gravel and dirt between the layers of the sole, requiring maintenance and periodic removal of the debris. The repair for this was bailing wire stitches placed like hog rings through the shoe lips. But back to the cardboard...a hole in the sole allows rocks and gravel and dirt into the weight bearing surfaces of the foot so the quick patch called for a layer of cardboard placed into the shoe in such a way that on putting on that shoe the paper stayed put over the hole under

the ball of the foot. The problem I never completely solved was how to keep the cardboard from migrating forward toward the toe of the shoe. You could use larger pieces but they eventually moved forward and bunched up on the toes. Regular pasteboard boxes were too soft to last more than a few hours, but cereal box cardboard, even though thinner was longer lasting. In general, printed cardboard was more durable. Layers of the glossy cardboard could last a full day but a hip pocket of reserve paper provided quick fixes when needed. Around the camp I was not self conscious about exposing the soles of my shoes, but at school it wasn't cool for someone to read "Kellogg's" or "Nabisco" on the bottoms of your shoes.



Now this was not just my problem. Cardboard sharing was common because the next kid likely had the same quality footwear and cardboard was like a commodity in the camp.

During recess and lunch hours the shoes came off and the fun began. Bare feet were faster and more tractable, besides feet need to breathe. I toyed with the idea of putting Shinola on the tops of my feet to simulate shoes for the teachers' sake. Now that I think about it, dressing for school was just plain tiresome. Non school days were simpler, especially in warm weather. When I lived at Westlake Farms, about three miles out of Stratford, my summer day schedule might involve a walk into town where I could find pop bottles and cash them in for a snack. I was a television Tarzan fan so my dress was usually only cut off jeans and nothing else until my brother David sent me a Marine helmet liner. The liner was the shape of a metal helmet and I morphed into GI Tarzan and began to carry a butcher knife in my belt loop.

### **Invisible Populations:**

MyArising Interest (continued from March) Jessielee Coley

I jumped into my article without giving a proper introduction. I am a third year pre-medical student studying biology at the University of California, Santa Barbara. During my first few months at UCSB I searched an array of volunteer opportunities, and unfortunately had difficulty finding my niche. It wasn't until last summer that I began volunteering for a nonprofit organization, Doctors Without Walls-Santa Barbara Street Medicine.


DWW-SBSM has six programs that focus on wrap around care, emergency relief and education. The organization holds weekly outdoors clinics, where I have learned the true meaning of austere medicine. We practice medicine facing the elements with only the tools we can carry in a backpack. The clinic takes place in a park; the running joke is to tell patients to step into our office as we point behind a large tree.

After the clinic in the park, we walk the streets of downtown Santa Barbara to search for patients who may have been unable to access our clinic. These "house calls" play a crucial role in helping our most vulnerable unsheltered patients. We have had countless experiences in which someone was in dire

need of medical attention, and many others where a granola bar and a pair of socks can have a huge effect on someone's day, and health!

This organization is run completely from volunteering doctors, nurses and students. I have two roles in this program; I am a scribe and an outreach worker. A scribe is useful position for the clinic in the park. They act as the doctor's shadow during patient interaction, and write every word during the conversation in order to keep accurate medical records. A hospitality/outreach worker is important for our mobile clinic. They are the first person to confront a prospective patient. If our entire team (normally 7 people) approached a patient it would be rather intimidating! If they don't need medical attention, we will provide them with food and water. I have never met a group of individuals more sincerely grateful to be provided with basic needs.

It was this unique volunteer experience that opened my eyes to "invisible" populations. Dr. Noemi "Mimi" Doohan, the founder of the organization, always says, "If you can practice medicine outdoors, you can practice medicine anywhere!" Her motto is extremely motivational through my journey to becoming a doctor. It's a long, winding road, but absolutely worth every bit of the challenge.

# **Truck parking on Center Street**

You may have noticed that there are fewer big rigs parking on Center St. between the Church and school. The County is in the process of posting the area on both sides of Center St. between the BNSF RR tracks eastward to Mt. Vernon Ave. that will prevent parking vehicles over 5 tons in this area. There is one exception by the Citrus Co-op packing house and Washburn's that will allow parking

trucks over 5 tons between the hours of 9:00 pm and 7:00 am. This exception is designed to allow truck drivers to wait in their trucks until the gates open in the morning for access to these 2 locations. Un-attended trucks after 7:00 am will be in violation of this parking restriction. However, the implementation of this ordinance still has to be approved by the Riverside County Board of Supervisors.



#### Ways to Prevent Your Child's Allergy Symptoms By Sarah Lindsey Highgrove resident

With the changing seasons, you may be noticing that your child is experiencing a stuffy or runny nose, sneezing, sore throat, cough, or dark circles under the eyes. These are all symptoms of seasonal allergies, which can be very uncomfortable for a child to endure. Here are some steps that you can take to help prevent these symptoms:

#### Identify allergy triggers

Allergy prevention lies in taking steps to remove dust mites, mold, animal dander, and pollen (such as tree, grass, and weed pollen) – which are all common allergens. The best prevention for allergies is to avoid anything that triggers your child's symptoms, or in other words, anything that they are allergic to. So try to be aware of what seems to cause their symptoms, and then as much as possible reduce their exposure to these triggers.

#### Look at the big picture

Walk through your house and see how many "dust collectors" you can find. Dust collectors are items, such as curtains or heavy drapes, carpets, upholstered furniture, stuffed animals, etc. Once you identify these in your home, try to find ways to minimize on these dust collectors, if possible. If they are there to stay, try to wash them (in hot water) on a regular basis.

#### Dust and vacuum often

Frequent dusting removes mites that can aggravate your child's symptoms. Just make sure to dust with a damp cloth so that you can remove as much of the allergens as possible. After dusting, vacuum to pick up any remaining dust as well as any food crumbs, pet hairs, etc. If possible, use a vacuum with a HEPA filter to help remove airborne allergens. (Never vacuum with your child in the room, as some dust particles are released into the air when vacuuming.)

#### Keep the "bed-bugs" out

For an allergy-prone child, do not use wool or feather comforters on their bed. Cover mattress, box spring, and pillows with zippered, dust-proof plastic covers. Also, wash sheets, blankets, and all bedding (in hot water) on a weekly basis.



#### Wash the dog

If you have pets in the house, wash them often to remove surface allergens. Try to keep them off of the furniture and carpets, and definitely keep them out of your child's bedroom.

#### Keep a clean house

Simple day-to-day things like dirty dishes, a full garbage can, or food crumbs can also contribute to your child's allergies. Frequently washing the dishes, emptying the garbage, and cleaning up after snacks and meals might do more than keep your house clean.

#### Check the furnace

Changing furnace and air conditioner filters several times a year is a quick and easy way to remove a lot of potential allergens that would otherwise be floating around your home.

#### Lock 'em out

Keep the house windows closed, especially at night. If taking any long drives during allergy seasons, keep the car windows closed, too. Locking out any airborne pollen will help to relieve your child's allergy symptoms.

#### Don't use a clothesline

During allergy seasons, do not hang clothes or linens outside to dry. Leaving them outside allows them to collect allergens that you won't want to bring in the house.

#### Leave them outside

Limit outdoor activities for your child when pollen counts are highest, especially between 5am and 10am. After playing outdoors, have your child take a bath or shower and change their clothes to reduce allergy symptoms.

#### Put away the toys

Some toys, such as stuffed animals, tend to collect a lot of dust. Keep and dust collecting toys out of your child's bedroom. Try to provide toys that can be washed, and then wash them often. If possible, store all the toys in a closed toy chest.

### A "LOVING" LOOK AT POLITICS by Jerry Loving

**Limits on Campaign Contributions** 

PACS or Political Action Committees have been around since 1944 and thru the years have given candidates they wanted elected or issues they wanted passed or defeated, laterally billions of dollars. I can't stress hard enough that the individual voter may be able to vote for a candidate, but it is the PACS that drive the media campaign and pay for the handouts, door knob hangers, and the campaign offices of their chosen candidates.

Most PACs are directly connected to specific corporations, labor groups, or recognized political parties. Examples of these PACs include Microsoft (a corporate PAC) and the Teamsters Union (organized labor). These PACs may solicit contributions from their employees or members and make contributions in the PACs name to candidates or political parties of their choice. Congress has been pressured thru the years to put a cap on what a corporation or individual can contribute to a PAC or even to the candidate, but since the group receiving the PAC money controls the country, they aren't about to turn off getting free money.

I don't have enough space to tell you of candidates thru the years that have refused PAC money and still got elected because they were FOR the people and supported their causes. However, eventually, normally within 10 years, these politicians lose their jobs because the PACS get behind their opponent and will actually spend millions to get their candidate to win.

Since moving to California and doing research on Riverside city and county, they have NO LIMIT on how much money can be given to someone running for office. Can you imagine a close race for City Council and PACS contributing over a million dollars to the respective candidates. Yes, even PACS may split who they vote for or against. Also, in Riverside, the candidates or incumbent doesn't have to report how much money he has been given for his race. Folks, with all that is going on in this country that is breaking us all apart financially to the world, politicians in Riverside could care less and just keep cashing the checks.

There is a big difference between a city or state candidate versus a federal office candidate. The federal government has set limits on how much money can be given to a candidate but they don't set a limit on the number of contributors that can give money to a candidate. For example, A Congressman can only accept \$2,500 from an individual or a corporation. Now, that seems fair and anyone reading that stipulation would smile and say: "We are in control of the political process." Wrong! Corporate contributions to a candidate number in the hundreds and the individuals in the thousands. Now that's a lot of money and we are not privilege to know who and how much someone gave to a candidate.

A little history: prior to 1985, if a candidate decided to drop out of a race, he could keep his campaign contributions. For example, when Governor George Wallace ran against Gerald Ford, he collected over \$10 million and dropped out of the race. Did he lose? There is no telling how much Richard Nixon took with him when he resigned as President but you can bet it was a

In closing, there should be two concerns each and every one of us taxpayers and voters should consider when there is an election: The first one has to do with the number or percentage of voters that participate in an election. When we dip below 29 percent, and we almost get there sometimes, we are matching the voting numbers that occur in the Soviet Union. Second. we need to know who and how much money was given to a candidate and how much did he spend and to whom. Some candidates have their wives set up campaign centers and collect all the contributions and supposedly spend it without naming where and how much and it is quite possible that it went directly to the candidate's house.

So, remember, on Election Day, please vote. It is your vote that preserves this nation as a Republic and allows us to function as a Democracy.




