HIGHGROVE DAY MAY 12, 2012



This will be the 27th annual celebration since Highgrove celebrated it's Centennial in 1986 and a lot of entertainment is planned for the day!

This year the Highgrove Day theme is "Hot Rods & Hoedown" and includes something for every age group. The gates open at both ends of the park at 7:00 am at the same time the pancake breakfast begins at the Norton Younglove Community Center, 938 W. Center St. in Highgrove. Family Service Association will be serving breakfast until noon. There will be a Car Show for vehicles 1972 or older in the Highgrove Community Park, a 40' X 40' canopy for the kid's zone with games for the children, a 40' X 60' canopy with a stage, dance floor, and seating for the entertainment. The opening ceremony will start at 9:00 am under the main canopy followed by the Reid Park Cheerleaders dancing to the Highgrove song. At 9:30 am the disc dogs will perform in the grassy area between the canopies followed by the Pony League game in the north park starting at 10:00 am. Also at 10:00 am the Single Swingers square dance group will perform under the main canopy followed by a trick Yo Yo demonstration at 10:30 am. At 11:00 am Mark Barnett (no relation) and the Southern Star band will play followed by Roxie Jane Barnett (granddaughter) singing on stage. At 12:15 pm the Riverside County Sheriff K-9 unit will show how these dogs are trained to get the bad guy in the grassy area. Dance Dimensions is scheduled to perform at 12:45pm followed the Southern Star Band again followed by the Cripple Creek Cloggers who will dance at 1:45 pm. The car show awards will be at 2:00 pm under the main canopy.

HOMELESS SHELTER GETS NEW SET OF WHEELS RTA vehicle gets second life with Path of Life Ministries RIVERSIDE, CA

A homeless shelter in Riverside now has its own van to whisk its guests to job training and child care.

The Path of Life Ministries shelter on Thursday took delivery of a 2006 Ford El Dorado van as part of the Riverside Transit Agency's (RTA) vehicle donation program that connects buses and vans with non-profit groups. The vehicles have exceeded their recommended service life and are no longer capable of remaining in the active fleet, but are in good condition and equipped with amenities such as wheelchair lifts.

Path of Life's Vice President of Operations Damien O'Farrell said the white van, which seats up to 12 people and has space for three wheelchairs, will come in handy for transporting guests to employment centers where they get hands-on training and job skills necessary to succeed. The van will also transport children to day care facilities.

"We are truly excited about this partnership, and the opportunity to close those gaps in services for people who are the most vulnerable," O'Farrell said. "Providing transportation to job training and child care is a huge step in right direction."

In addition to a safe and warm place to sleep, shelter guests are offered an evening hot meal, breakfast in the morning, and shower and laundry facilities. Adults meet with staff to identify and reach their individual goals. Referrals to and assistance from community resources are also available. Each year, the shelter serves nearly 900 guests, the majority of which are children.

County Supervisors John Tavaglione and Bob Buster, who sit on the RTA Board of Directors, helped facilitate the donation. Buster said RTA's donation program prolongs the life of these useful vehicles and allows groups such as Path of Life Ministries to enhance their services.

"Transportation is critical for helping people get on their feet, restore family and strengthen their financial opportunities," Buster said. "RTA is putting tax-payer dollars to good use by giving these vehicles a longer, more productive life."


Said Tavaglione, "This is an extraordinary opportunity to put this vehicle to good use for a truly worthy cause. During these tough economic times, groups such as Path of Life are making a positive difference in our community."


Shown above is Ken Jure who I worked with for many years until I retired in 2001. I also worked with his dad who was a Trainmaster in San Bernardino but who is also retired.



Riverside County agricultural exports to China By Tom Freeman



In an effort to increase agricultural exports from the County of Riverside to China county leaders are reaching out to Chinese officials within a number of provinces to establish trading relationships that expand exports. China is the a major destination for agricultural products produced in the County of Riverside with fully 20 percent of all agricultural products produced in the County of Riverside being sold to Chinese consumers. Only Japan purchases more of the agricultural products produced in Riverside County and they account for 35 percent of agricultural exports. Riverside County Supervisor John Tavaglione said "Our farmers are exporting record numbers of agricultural products to 67 countries around the globe and increasing those sales is important in creating jobs here at home for our workforce. Our farmers are creating and sustaining jobs here far behind their harvesting operations. They are creating and sustaining jobs in the food processing industry, with our rail roads, ports, trucking industry, and our grocery stores. We are ogy manufactures.

proud to be the home of over 1,200 farming operations here in Riverside County."

Bilateral talks included County Agricultural Commissioner John Snyder, County Trade Commissioner Tom Freeman, and Farmer Bureau Executive Director Steve Pastor. Chinese officials from Jiangsu Province were led by its Vice Director of its Grain Bureau Zhu Xinhua. The delegation of 20 officials from the Chinese agricultural industry discussed topics ranging from increased exports, crop production, crop value, agricultural regulations relating to exports and imported products, and the cost of water for crop irrigation. Fresh dates and oranges produced in Riverside County were on display and enjoyed by guests.

Meetings with Chinese investor Xingfa Xue, Chairman of the Board of XY Group. XY Group has a number of U.S. holdings in the energy and technology fields and is a leading developer in mainland China. Mr. Xue is also considering investment in Riverside County based technol-

DEVILS DEN by Dennis Wilds

By now the sky was full of cumulus clouds, blocking out the sun, cooling down Valliant a good ten degrees. Baby was feeling considerably more relaxed like Myrtle said he would so he rolled up his coat for a pillow and laid down between the stroller and his table and pondered the coming weather front above. "Here comes the parade!" Yelled Myrtle. "And look who's leading it.

From around the corner turning onto the main street the Valliant School band, led by a prancing David, marched out into the middle of the road to the beat of snare drums and one bass drum. David was a good twenty feet ahead of the majorette, an Indian girl wearing a squaw's dress, white cowgirl boots, a full feather head dress and twirling a chrome baton. David was high steppin with his chest pushed out and his head back, bean flip in hand like a staff, keeping time with the march rhythm laid down by the band behind him. Myrtle and Caesar laughed and howled at this making Baby sit up straight and laugh himself. The grinning Delphia rejoined the group and placed the sleeping Levester in his buggy and sat down next to Baby and laughed out loud at the comical sight of a kid in overalls pretending to be a drum major in front of the two-hundred or so townsfolk on Main Street. When the band had progressed alongside the library lawn, David peeled off and did a cartwheel onto the lawn and flopped down between Caesar and Myrtle, laughing himself. The band began with a rousing rendition of "Anchors Aweigh" prompting some of the veterans in the crowd to salute the band. The music seemed to surround Baby like no music had ever sounded before. He swore he could see the colors of the music as it enveloped him there on the lawn. He glanced sideways at Delphia and saw her swaying her head left and right with the beat too. Behind the band Moe Irons' contingent of cowboys carried the Oklahoma and United

States' flags on horseback. Following the flag bearers about a hundred feet back, the Moe Irons Rodeo Stock truck chugged by with the biggest brindle colored Brahman bull Baby had ever seen penned up in the stake bed. David hollered out, "That's Dah-no-mite, my uncle Moe's brimmer bull who ain't never been rode yet!"

That was no exaggeration either, since no one had ever successfully ridden Dynamite the full eight seconds rodeo rules required. At close to two thousand pounds, Dynamite stood relatively still in the moving stake bed truck, turning his head sideways to lazily look at the passing crowd of people. Dynamite's skin was smooth with loose wrinkles here and there. On top of the bull's massive shoulders a mass of muscle and gristle marked Dynamite as one hundred percent Brahman Zulu bovine. His massive floppy ears drooped lazily past his cheeks behind his large brown eyes which were protected by long upper lid lashes. Dynamite had thick horns which curved slightly upward for their foot and a half lengths ending in straight blunt tips, below his chin hung a foot long dewlap of loose skin. Mike was famous in rodeo circles for a stunt he performed at the beginning of each rodeo. He would dress up as a grandma in a granny dress and large bonnet and sit atop Dynamite in a rocking chair tied to Dynamite's back. When the bull chute opened releasing the bull out into the arena, Mike was lucky to last two seconds before getting airborne before the howling crowd. An

Newer appliances- dishwasher & stove ordinary man couldn't have pulled that stunt off each weekend but Mike was an athlete of considerable skill and as soon as he hit the dirt he was adept at finding his feet and heading for the fence while the rodeo clowns lured Dynamite off in the other direction.

Following the truck one cowgirl on foot led a small flock of goats tethered together with a rope. These were Uncle Moe's goat roping stock and the lead goat was a Billy wearing a shirt and a tie. Delphia said under her breath, "There goes Booger now. Looks just like him." Her sarcastic tone caught Baby's attention. With that, Delphia stood up and reached into the buggy for the paregoric bottle and spoon. Adeptly she ladled a spoonful into the drowsy Levester's mouth, followed by a good swig from the bottle for herself. She was determined to enjoy the parade without Levester's crying. Returning to her place next to Baby, Delphia sat back down almost touching the young preacher boy, shoulder to shoulder with him.

Behind Mike, Moe's two rodeo clowns were on foot pushing two colorful wooden barrels back and forth in the street. One of the two, wearing high water pants with red suspenders and a bull's eye sewn to the trap door of his coveralls, hopped up on his barrel and began to walk it down the street making exaggerated balancing motions with his arms to the delight of the kids in the crowd. 

The Colton Joint Unified School Board (CJUSB) the entity responsible for appointing a principal for the new high school in Grand Terrace has chosen a remarkable woman to handle that task. Her name is Angie Disinger and she is very beautiful. I met her a few days ago dressed to the hilt as she came to Grand Terrace Mayor Walt Stanckiewitz' home, near mine. They were meeting to discuss her plans and feelings about her position as our principal. Walt said, "I am looking forward to working with her."

Angie is highly qualified for this position with having been employed before at Bloomington High School as assistant principal. I talked at length to Katie Orloff longtime school board employee who said that "Angie is very passionate about what she does. She is a noted teacher and is highly qualified for this job. What is going to be interesting will be how the kids will accept her. I believe that her beauty will hold her in good stead but her background and ability will be tested when she has a full compliment of children and teachers to oversee.

PROGRESS OF GT HIGH SCHOOL:

Wow! Driving by the campus, passersby can see the gymnasium and classroom building stair towers rising above the fence line. Exterior building block walls are substantially complete with exterior architectural steel finishes being attached to the top of the walls.

Although not visible to passersby, interior work throughout the campus continues and is varying stages of completion depending on the building. Interior work of classrooms consists of drywall, utility duct work, wiring and piping, and casework (cabinets). Hardscaping and landscaping have started.

With \$36 million in state funding received for other projects in hold for now and lunches would January 2011 Measure G funding has been reallocated to complete the campus build-out of Grand Terrace

High School. This scope of work consists of pool, stadium, bleachers, tennis courts, student services, classroom building and additional parking.

It will take 12 months to complete and will dovetail with the completion of the main campus this month. Suffolk Roel is the general contractor with Vanir Construction Management administering the contract.



Subsidized means that PART of the cost of each meal is paid for by the government, The remaining cost is expected to be covered by the \$3 donation that is suggested. Since those under 60 MUST pay \$5 one might assume that the actual cost of each meal must be about \$5. It seems logical that if enough participants DO NOT contribute to the donation box then the fund will run short and the service would have to


