



Highgrove's Jurassic Park Owner, Shelby Shinkle Dies of Complications!





In June of 2018, when I asked Shelby if he receives the Highgrove Happenings Newspaper he showed me he already had one with him on his tractor.

Shelby Shinkle

Feb.11, 1943 to Aug. 9, 2021



The unique property in Highgrove that has been called Highgrove's Jurassic Park has lost it's creator who spent 14 years working on his 3 acre property to turn it into one of the most unique private properties in Riverside County.

He accomplished many things and improved this location to create a place to display his passion for Dinosauers. He had great visions and expectations and he did a lot of work to secure his property such as a fence, steel gate, and a block wall and other improvements. His property was not open to the public but he enjoyed collecting unique items that he may be able to use or re-sell for a profit. He liked going to the Habitat for Humanity on Iowa Avenue, auctions, and garage sales and over a period of many years he collected many things that he wanted but may not have needed that were left on his property when he just ran out of time.

Shelby and I became friends and he had a passion and a vision for his property that I found facisiting. He was very protective of his property but allowed me to do an article with pictures of his dinosauers that is available on our web site by going to: www. highgrovehappenings.net and clicking on Latest issue and June 2018.

In the latter part of June, 2021, I noticed that his pick up truck had been sitting outside his gate for a long time with a large roll of carpet extending out the back. And when I couldn't see any activity or response to my calls I



was concerned that he may have fallen somewhere on his property and needed assistance so I called the Highgrove Fire Department. Shortly thereafter three Firemen from Highgrove's Station 19 arrived as well as two Sheriff Deputies and two paramedics from American Medical Response.

The Firemen and Sheriff deputies cut the lock on the gate and did a thorough search of Shelby's property. Finally, they returned to the gate and reported that they did not see anyone on the property or laying in the brush.


At that point I did not know where my friend was or if he was OK. The next day when I picked up Shelby's mail, there was a note in the mailbox from Isabel Alaya, a Highgrove resident who met Shelby when he came to her garage sale, who said an ambulence took Shelby away from the property on June 24, 2021 and she had the keys to his truck that was given to her by the paramedics.

Shelby was a Veteran and at that time we did not know where he was. Later we found out that he had been taken to the Loma Linda Hospital and then to a nursing facility in La Sierra. I went to La Sierra and they would not let me in to see him due to Covid 19 and I could only see him from outside his window (Cont. on P. 3)



from about 10 feet away while I tried talking to him on the phone. I think he knew I was there but he was un-responsive.

Later the Vetrans hospital contacted his brother in Massachuttes on the phone to update Lance about Shelby's condition. And since Shelby is in Southern California and his brother lives in far away Massachusetts, I offered to provide a place for Shelby's brother, Lance to stay if he needed to come to California.

I talked to Shelby's brother on the phone several times but I first met Lance and his wife Maria when I picked them up at the Ontario Airport on August 1, 2021. The next day we went to Palm Terrace in La Sierra and visited Shelby but I don't think Shelby ever knew his brother was there to see him.


Both Shelby and Lance were born in Upland, California and Lance is Shelby's only living relative who has lived in Cape Cod, Massachusetts for many years.

Shelby was diagnosed with dimentia and later he tested positive for Covid 19 and on August 9, 2021 Shelby passed away 9 days after Lance and Maria arrived.

Here are some pictures of what was left on his property when he passed away. His brother Lance and Maria are in the process of cleaning up the property.




This 8 foot tall Gorilla has a mean disposition and is one of the security guards. He doesn't like to see tressspassers on his property.




This Brontasaurus is really showing his age and could use some tender loving care and attention.


ALLIGATOR





December 7th will the eightieth year of the attack on Pearl Harbor- "a date which will live in infamy." (FDR) and was the worst attack on Americans in our history. We thought we had seen the worst. We went to war, won that war with great sacrifice and we were confident no country would ever have the audacity to attack the United States again. How wrong we were.

The date "9-11" instantly brings to mind the horrific images of the day. To those who lived it, citizens, family of the victims, and the thousands of first responders who were there, it is a yearly reminder of their terror and heartache. This year America will be the the 20th observance of the attack on the Twin Towers in New York City. Of the nearly 3,000 victims killed in the attacks on the east coast, 412 were emergency workers in New York City who responded to the World Trade Center. The numbers are sobering. Firefighters and paramedics, police officers and EMTs from all over the city and New Jersey. The name, age, and rank of all the first responders are easily obtained on the internet. To read through it pierces the heart. So many brave people.

Too many too young; leaving behind thousands of bereaved family, friends, and surviving colleagues. The surviving first responders don't want to be referred to as heroes. To them the heroes are the ones who didn't get to go home to their families, go back to their stations or their firehouses. However the survivors haven't come away unscathed. Thousands suffer from PTSD and serious health ailments. Many won't survive themthey are also victims of 9-11.

When the towers fell, within seconds building materials, furniture, electronics and horrifically, human remains were pulverized and rained down on anyone in a large radius of the towers. For weeks the toxic dust continued to fill the air around the site. Health complaints were the expected respiratory illnesses, but various cancers are an acute problem. Due to the nature of cancer, it didn't appear quickly. The toxins take awhile to have their deleterious effect on the body. The Mt Sinai Icahn School of Medicine concluded that there's "evidence of increased risk for certain cancers among WTC-exposed responders."; stopping short of calling the cancer outbreak an epidemic. Compared to the general population, first responders are getting cancer at a 9 percent higher rate, a 41 percent higher risk of leukemia, a 25 percent higher risk of prostate cancer, and a stunning 219 percent higher risk of thyroid cancer. The evidence shows that the first responders, while their lives were not sacrificed on 9-11, are continuing to give their lives in service to their community. Continued on page 9







Beyond Highgrove's Boundaries

I am glad I live in a small community such as Highgrove, aren't you?
















Fix It Up or Tear It Down!
