New Highgrove to Grand Terrace bus ser- Video taping Center St. for new Sewer line vice includes free rides during trial period



RTA bus 25 is shown crossing the railroad tracks at Iowa Avenue. Through the combined efforts of the Riverside Transit Agency in Riverside County and Omnitrans in San Bernardino County, a new bus route No.325 will replace the RTA route 25. The new route will still enable riders to travel from Highgrove to Grand Terrace and Loma Linda but on Sept. 7, 2010, route 325 will include a stop in Highgrove in front of the new library located on Center St. and Michigan Ave. for access to businesses in Grand Terrace. The new route and will also include a side trip to the Grand Terrace Senior Center.

The route coming from Riverside will still be along Iowa Ave. then east on Center St., north on Michigan Ave., east on Barton Road and through Grand Terrace to Loma Linda.

This new 7 day a week service called "Omnigo-Your Hometown Shuttle" will provide free bus rides between Highgrove and Grand Terrace and Loma Linda from Sept. 7th to Sept. 30th.

Another RTA route 14, will bypass the Grand Terrace businesses and go onto the I-215 at Barton Road and Michigan Ave. in Grand Terrace and then eastward on the I-10 to Loma Linda.

RCTC fails to respond to registered letter!

On July 27, 2010, I sent a registered letter to Ann Mayer, the Executive Director of the Riverside County Transportation Commission and I received a notification via return mail that my letter had been received.

There has been no answer to the very important basic questions in the letter about the proposed Metrolink station location in the Highgrove area.

On Aug. 23, I received a call from Art Bernal asking what they are doing walking down Center St. with a video camera. I found out that it was being videotaped before the actual construction begins so when the new sewer line is completed the properties can be restored back to original. (photo above) The new sewer line will begin near Michigan Ave. and go westward down Center St. and turn southward just before the freeway and continue along East La Cadena Dr. where it will connect to the City of Riverside sewer system at Palmyrita Ave. on the east side of the freeway.

Notices should be sent out the first part of September to residences and businesses along Center St. so everyone pass it on to you.

will be aware of the proposed construction. The sewer line will be 8 inches in diameter near Michigan Ave. and will get as large as 18 inches in diameter as it proceeds toward the Palmyrita Ave. connection. The fenced off area on the north side of Center St. near Garfield and the fenced off area on the south side of Center St. near the railroad track will be used for equipment storage, sewer pipe, and for temporary storage of dirt that is removed for the line.

This is the first step in a long term plan to sewer the entire Highgrove area but don't plan on hooking up just yet. Information is not available at this time to give a target date for hooking up but as we receive more information we will





Dear Ann,

The disagreement between the public and RCTC regarding a Metrolink station location between Riverside and Perris in the Highgrove area has lasted for almost 9 years.

During that time we have documented many reasons why we feel the Highgrove Metrolink location would be the best location to serve the most passengers. But the written resolutions of support from surrounding cities, letters from local civic organizations, and many comments at the RCTC meetings and public hearings have continually been opposed by your agency.

Many residents are asking why RCTC wants to build a station in the Hunter Park area instead of in Highgrove where there are existing commuter trains that would benefit the region on both sides of the county line.

The citizens and residents have given their reasons for supporting the Highgrove location and now we are requesting that you give your reasons for wanting to build a station in the Hunter Park area.

We need your reasons why your location is better. Please list the reasons for RCTC's choice for a station location in the Hunter Park area and state where the station will be located. Also, list the reasons you are against a station location in Highgrove on the west side of the same property needed to connect the 2 railroads.

Dole Foods building 507,000 sq. ft. Warehouse on Palmyrita Avenue

If you have been on Palmyrita Ave. lately you may have seen the giant warehouse under construction between the Perris Valley Line railroad track and the Riverside Line railroad track.

Or maybe you have read about it in one of our previous issues. This large warehouse is being built on the 25 acre property south of Palmyrita Ave. and north of Columbia Avenue.

This whole area is dominated by warehouses. My question to the contractor at the construction site was "Why do they continue building warehouses when so many of them are vacant?"

He explained that this particular building that is being constructed is designed as a cold storage facility that is a special construction with extensive insulation. The floor has an 8 inch base, 3 inches of sub slab, 6 inches of foam, and 8 inches of concrete. There will be an area that will be kept at minus 10 degrees and another area at minus 20 degrees. There will be a wet area to keep produce fresh and other areas for meat, bananas, ice cream and other items to be distributed. The walls are 50 feet high but the structure will only be one level.

Estimates are that the building will be ready in Jan. or Feb. 2011. The contractor, Fullmer Construction from Ontario is also the contractor for another separate project right next to the Dole warehouse. The Sabert Corporation project is the expansion of an existing warehouse on Palmyrita Avenue. (See page 7)

got bones?

Depression is a common disorder that strikes young and old, male and female, rich or poor. It is not a weakness, or laziness, being a crybaby or a character flaw. Understanding and not fearing depression will bring comfort to those suffering from it and affected for those affected by a loved one with depression. Taking away the fear and the stigma allows those who are suffering from depression the freedom to seek treatment. With proper treatment comes relief from the physical and emotional pain of depression.

While the exact cause of depression is not known, we do know that the brain undergoes a chemical change, one that requires medication to be treated. There is a long list of possible medications that may be prescribed and each person will respond differently to each one. Because the medications to treat depression need to be gradually introduced, take time to take effect, and if necessary, take time to withdraw, the proper medica-

tion cannot always be quickly identified. Also depression usually brings physical symptoms that need to be differentiated from the same physical symptoms due to other unrelated causes. One might be trying to see improvement in a physical symptom thought to be from depression and that symptom may have nothing to do with depression at all, further clouding the issue. The reverse is also true. Many physical symptoms associated with depression are investigated thinking they are due to other causes.

There is a lot of resistance to seeking treatment for depression. The stigma of mental illness runs centuries old and is not easily erased. In February 1692, Dr. William Griggs, a Salem, Massachusetts physician, concluded two young girls were "bewitched". From then until May 1693 over 150 people- children includedwere accused of practicing witchcraft

or of being bewitched. All were arrested; many were imprisoned, put to death, or died while the accusers tried to extract confessions from them. We now know that some of the symptoms many were having, that of being bewitched, with indications of a serious mental illness, were actually due to ergot poisoning; the fungus of the rye grain they made their bread from. Throughout the next 350 years or more, persons with serious mental illnesses were locked up in "loony bins", shackled, given electrical shock "treatment", and in general, closeted away. These poor patients are portrayed as babbling, incoherent, and raving, with matted hair, filthy clothes, eating spoiled food, feces, and in general being frighteningly disgusting. No wonder people were and still are afraid of mental illness. The good news is that depression just doesn't fit into this category. But depression is still a very

serious illness; one that can ruin lives, cause loss of employment, is a stimulus for divorce, and in the worst cases, death by suicide.

Depression can run in families as well. However there is a saying: "Genetics loads the cannon, behavior pulls the trigger." In the case of depression, replace the word behavior with circumstances. In certain persons, circumstances will trigger the onset of depression. The causes are numerous and not limited to the ones normally expected such as death of a loved one or divorce. The onset of depression can also be insidious with no apparent cause. No matter what the cause, it is critical that depression be treated appropriately and effectively.



Cage Park: Fond memories!




This entry sign brings back a lot of good memories when Cage Park had green grass, beautiful trees, and a pond. It is located on Main St. and Transit Ave. by the BNSF railroad tracks and was the location we used for several years for the Highgrove Picnic. One year we hired the Riverside Concert Band to perform under the trees for the enjoyment of everyone. It was a beautiful place (except for the train whistling for Main St.) and the only requirement was that you could reserve the park through an Edison employee and just leave the park clean after your event was over.

The former park is gone now and all that remains is a locked gate with warning signs. Everything inside in dried up and dead.

On Oct. 16, 1999 the Highgrove Community Park that we know today was opened and dedicated and now the original Highgrove Picnic has evolved into "Highgrove Day". Our 5 acre park is enjoyed by many who like to play basketball or walk the track and the Highgrove Pony League has 2 fields for our kids to play on.

Power Plant Demolition

Taylor St. is also where the former power plant is being demolished. Years ago this was referred to as the Steam Plant and was at one time owned by Edison. The south end of the power plant property is where Cage Park was located. The demolition has been underway for several months. No other information is available at this time about what will happen to the property after the land is cleared. This land is located just west of the new Grand Terrace High School and the Riverside Line railroad track on Taylor St. in Grand Terrace but has always been referred to as the Highgrove power plant even though it is not in Highgrove.



Part of the structure is still standing and the remaining structure has been wrapped in plastic during the asbestos removal process.

"Stipends" divide Grand Terrace candidates!

On Aug. 24, 2010 I attended the Grand Terrace city council meeting and it was very interesting and sometimes intense.

The agenda included voting on an agreement between the Redevelopment Agency and Stater Bros. but no action was taken because there was not a quorum of city council members to vote on the issue. Lee Ann Garcia was not present due to illness and Walt Stanckiewitz abstained because his business is too close to the proposed Stater Bros. project. Former Councilman Jim Miller resigned last March and his council seat is up for election. That left only Mayor Maryetta Ferre' and Bea Cortes to vote on the Stater Bros. issue.

There has been a special meeting set for Sept. 1, 2010 to address the Stater Bros. agreement. (See P. 11)

The meeting became quite controversial when the public hearing was opened pertaining to Stipends for the Grand Terrace City Council.

Walt Stanckiewitz, current city councilman running for mayor locked horns with former city manager, Tom Schwab, who is a candidate for the city council, concerning payments made to council members for reimbursement of expenses over the last 30 years.

Current city manager Betsy Adams stated that current and former council members were paid more than allowed by state law. They receive \$150.00 per month and should get \$30.00 per meet-

ing instead.

Councilman Stanckiewitz ask if the process has been going on for 30 years why are they only going back 3 years? Instead of the amount being \$14,000 it could be \$140,000 according to Stanckiewitz.

Former Grand Terrace city manager, Tom Schwab stated that stipends are not considered income but are considered reimbursment of expenses and there is no reason to pay payroll taxes on the reimbursment of expenses. Schwab stated he takes full responsibility for 24 of the 30 years that W-2's were not issued to the council members. He suggested that they should eliminate stipends and not have to worry about withholding or paying payroll taxes.

Councilmember Bea Cortes read a prepared statement stating the oversight was not intentional and offered to pay the city back for her overpayment for the last 8 years.

Mayor Maryetta Ferre' said that is was a mistake and it will be corrected!

Highgrove MAC members receive no



"Ding, ding" went the engineer's train bell and I came to as the train pulled back to where we started in the general vicinity of the carnival area. It was getting close to noon and I could smell the burgers from the snack shack as I wandered toward the Ferris wheel and the roller coaster. Watching, I noted that occasionally people would get a ticket at a small outhouse looking building and then hand it to a fella standing by the Ferris wheel. Once three or four cars were loaded, the bored looking worker would set the wheel in motion and up and away the riders would swing toward the sky and back down again making some of the littler kids scream at first. This looked like great fun so I went over to the shack and inquired about the ticket cost. An elderly lady inside said each ride was five cents so I reminded her I was from Stratford and the book club and wondered if the ride was included in my deal. I added that I had read over twenty books so far. This was probably more information than she needed, so barely looking up from a book she was reading, the old gal pushed a couple tickets out of the half moon slot toward me without saying a word as she moved two nickels from a can on one side of her desk over to a small metal strong box on the other side. I was off to the wheel making a mental note to read more books when I got back to Stratford.

After waiting way too long for my turn, I climbed up into the waiting Ferris wheel car and began the incremental ascent higher and higher as subsequent

cars accepted their passengers below me. I had made the mistake of climbing high up in a eucalyptus tree and getting too scared to come down in the past but this was a bit higher and it was scary at first until I got used to the funny feeling in my stomach as each spin crested at the top and then dropped downward toward another revolution. Besides, I was too cool to scream anyway. After a few revolutions, I relaxed into sightseeing as the distant tall buildings of downtown Fresno appeared on the horizon. Some were over five stories tall and bigger than the Stratford cotton gin. I could see the occasional group of visitors headed toward the entrance. Pondering missed






